Two Drownings.

Last Saturday evening, as the little steamer Ruth was nearing Daniels creek, on Catching slough, with considerable freight and several passengers, young Elmer Norton, son of William Norton, aged about 16 years, was about to jump from the boat to his home landing, but instead fell into the slough and was drowned in sight of passengers and crew. It is not stated exactly how the young man happened to fall in. There was considerable floor piled up on the bow of the boat, and possibly by a jolt of the boat the young man went overboard, for instead of getting ashore, he was seen to be in the water with several sacks of the flour, holding on to one and striving to keep himself up. And, notwithstanding it seemed as if he might have been saved by the efforts of those on board, yet he sank and was drowned. The accident occurred close to his home.

A BODY FOUND.

Bidders will state specifically the kind and quality of timber they propose to use in the construction of said bridge. Said bridge, main span to be about 125 feet, and about 43 feet above low water mark. Arson on south bank to be about 33 feet and on north bank about 30 feet.
