About 150,000 Men Needed.

San Francisco, June 21.—Dr. Chas. A. McQuesten, who was on the staff of General Otis and was health officer at Manila, has returned home. Captain McQuesten made a close study of the conditions in the Philippine situation. He is of the opinion that it will take from 100,000 to 150,000 soldiers to properly subdue and hold the islands.

Capital Journal: The new weekly paper at Portland is making a commendable fight for reform in the matter of tax collecting in Multnomah county. Delinquent taxes have not been declared delinquent for years, delinquents have not been advertised, taxes have not been collected and general bedlam has reigned supreme, whereby the tax dodger has profited, the warrant speculator had a harvest and the real property owner who thought it his patriotic duty to pay up was unmercifully bled.

The municipal hospital of Moscow, which was founded in 1764, has accommodations for 7000 persons, and in the course of a year it receives 15,000 patients. Canadian Editors Entertained at Portland.

Portland, June 19.—The Canadian editors, who arrived here from the north this morning, were entertained during the day by the Portland Press club and the citizens of Portland, and tonight at 11:30 they left for home. They were taken to points of interest about Portland, given a banquet at the Commercial Club this afternoon and a reception this evening at the Hotel Portland. The Canadian and American flags were displayed on many buildings, and pictures of Queen Victoria and President McKinley adorned the walls of the hotel parlors during the reception. H. W. Scott, editor of the Oregonian, delivered the address of welcome to the visitors.

How The Spreckels-Graham Case Stands.

Judgment has been entered by Judge Bahr in favor of the plaintiff in the suit of the J. D. Spreckels & Brothers Company against R. A. Graham for \$523,162.52 on a promissory note, with interest at 8 per cent per annum from April 1, 1899. This judgment is in accordance with a stipulation made by the parties. The mortgage on the securities given for the payment of the note has been foreclosed by the judgment, but a stay of execution for six months was allowed. This ending of the suit is the result of a compromise, which was reported recently.—S. F. Chronicle, June 15.

State Normal School.

The State Normal School at Monmouth announces a new department, that of Manual Training, in addition to the departments of last year. It has also added to its training department an ungraded school, to give practice in the work of the country schools. The training department is now perhaps the most complete in the United States. A new building offers increased facilities for work, and the next year promises to be the best the school has known. The catalogue shows a marked gain in attendance for the present year. Drouth Stricken Already.

Denver, June 22.—According to reports received by Secretary Martin, of the National Livestock Association, a drouth has destroyed all the large Colorado ranges. Already the cattle are dying in San Luis valley. Like conditions, varying in severity, are reported in northern New Mexico, and parts of Oklahoma, Indian Nations, western Kansas and southern Utah.

Marcus Daly Will Compete With Smelter Trust.

Denver, June 20.—The Times tonight says: Marcus Daly, the Montana millionaire miner, smelter and horse breeder, is coming to Colorado to live. He brings with him from \$6,000,000 to \$10,000,000 to invest. He has an option on land for a stock ranch, and expects to engage in smelting and refining independent of the American Smelting & Refining Company.

In 1897 the regular Liverpool lines brought into the Mersey over 251,000 head of cattle from the United States and Canada, and the total loss was not more than 454 head, or about one-sixth of one per cent. Of the total number above mentioned the White Star line carried over one-sixth, or 42,738 head, and only lost twenty-four head.

Detroit, Mich., June 23.—Governor Pingree gave out a public statement today to the effect that he had combined with Secretary Alger in the interest of General Alger's senatorial candidacy. Alger will not withdraw under any circumstances, nor will he spend any money in the campaign. The platform of their campaign will be made opposition to trusts and a declaration in favor of senatorial elections by a popular vote. The alliance was made at a conference held last night at which several Pingree state leaders and Alger and the governor were present.

A large barge in tow of a tug from San Francisco is expected here soon for a cargo of coal from the Campbell mine at Riyerton.
