The river steamer Bismarck, after so long a sojourn with the ocean waves on her transfer from Rogue River to the Coquille, then with the government for a technical infraction of the law, and later delays at commissioning from various causes, reached this place last Wednesday evening and took her position in the line of several boats to await the government officials for inspection and commission.

Alva Lee officiated at the wheel and Gurley Bank as engineer from Bandon to this place. The Bismarck is 104 feet long and has 20 feet beam, and her passenger accommodations are commodious and comfortable, being enclosed. The hurricane deck is ample and comfortably seated, affording pleasant and attractive quarters in pleasant weather and to sight-seers. She was built in 1892, and during her late tie-up has been strengthened, repainted and much improved. James Moore was the original owner, who has been joined by our well-known and popular fellow-citizen, Sam McAdams, and the new firm has equipped the vessel for the run from Bandon to Myrtle Point and return each day, and desire to merit the patronage of the traveling public and shippers on the river, to whom they pledge courteous and careful service.
