Coos Bay News: It will be lawful to kill deer on the 15th of this month; but the law prevents the sale of the flesh, hide or horns of such animal, and it is also unlawful for any person or corporation to buy, transport or carry for purpose of trade, sale, barter or exchange, the skin, hide, horns, hoofs or other flesh of any deer, moose or mountain sheep. The fine is from \$15 to \$200, together with cost of prosecution.

Our old friend J. B. Fox is very energetic as a member of the school board, and displays as much good judgment and tact for having everything just right and to promote the comfort and efficiency of the school as if he had just graduated from a modern school himself. (Port Orford Tribune.) W. T. Kerr is having a new wagon constructed for use on the Port Orford-Gold Beach stage line.

The Katie Cook, from Rogue River, was in our harbor last Wednesday night on her way to the Coquille, where she goes for inspection. She returned to Rogue River Sunday, and towed the schooner Del Norte into the river.

Hon. E. S. Platts, upon receiving a commission from L. P. W. Quimby, state game and forestry warden, appointing him a state deputy warden, passed down the coast July 3d, looking after the interests of the state regarding game and forests. It is Mr. Platts' intention to look closely after the dealers in deer skins. He says all persons have had free opportunity to know what the law is regarding hunting and setting fires, and that any one caught violating the law need not look for any clemency from him.

E. B. Burns passed down Monday last from a business visit to Portland. Mr. Burns informs us that he has let a contract at Coquille City for the building of a gasoline vessel 56 feet in length, 12 feet beam and 11 feet depth of hold. The vessel will be fitted with a 30 horse power gasoline engine and with sails, and will ply between Rogue River and Coos Bay, making regular trips, and connecting with the Portland steamers. The principal object is to ship copper ore from Rogue River to Portland, but a general freighting business will be conducted and Port Orford will be made an intermediate point.
