Paris, Aug. 21.—The prefecture of police gives the following statistics of yesterday's riots: Three hundred and eighty persons were injured; sixty were taken to the hospitals; fifty-nine police agents were wounded, besides Commissioners Coutier and Dolismine. One hundred and fifty persons were arrested, of whom eighty are detained in custody.

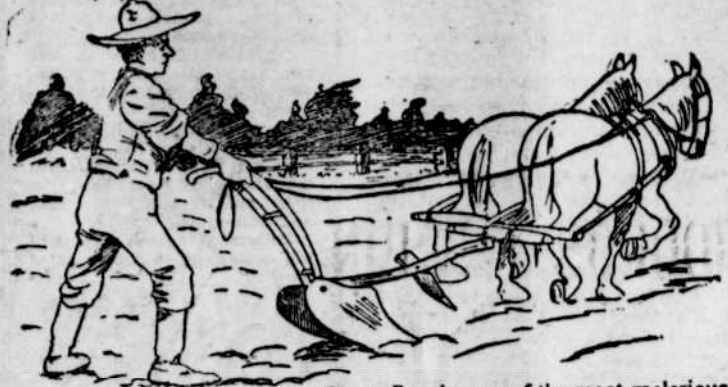
