The court accepted the timbers unhesitatingly, as they were fine material and believed to be the equal of the best of any ever used in bridges in Coos county. There were 12,000 feet of hewn timber supplied. While this was proceeding, the bridge contractors were putting in their cylinder piers, for the steel superstructure. The bridge will probably be finished and turned over to the county the last of this week.

The difference in freight rates to this place, while steamers are running to this river and when they are not, and we are compelled to ship by the bay, are obvious, and there is much just cause for complaint. Sewing machines have formerly been received here from Chicago by the river, and by railroad via the bay, at rates ranging from \$3 to \$5. A few days ago one was received by a citizen from the above place for which the freight paid was \$6.15, distributed along the route in the following amounts: From Chicago to San Francisco, \$1.70; from San Francisco to Marshfield, \$2.70; from Marshfield to Coquille City, \$1.75. Here we have the freight costing us 5 cents more from Marshfield, a distance of 18 miles, than from Chicago to San Francisco, a distance of 1600 miles. But what are you going to do about it?
