The total value of taxable property for the year 1899, in this county, as equalized, is \$592,436, upon which county tax as follows has been levied: For county purposes, 15 mills; for bridge fund, 7 mills; for school purposes, 6 mills. The total county and bridge levy is three mills less than the county levy last year.

[Coos Bay News.]

The Alert brought down several scow loads of logging trucks from North Coos river, last week, which were forwarded to the Coquille.

Mrs. Sarah Clevenger, of Grants Pass, president of the Rebekah Assembly, will visit, officially, Western Star Lodge on Wednesday evening, Sept. 27th.

The Blanco towed a rock scow and three donkey engines to the quarry on North Coos river Sunday. Everything is being put in readiness for the starting of work in the near future.

Sunday was a scorcher—the hottest day of the year by several degrees. The mercury reached 94 in the shade on Myrtle street, in the forenoon. It was not so warm, however, along the water front.

W. B. Piper, sawyer at the Porter mill, was in town Sunday. We learn from him that the mill is cutting on an average over 60,000 feet of lumber per day, and that there is at present 1,000,000 feet on the wharf awaiting shipment. The new schooner Admiral, lately launched at North Bend, will load lumber and piles at Porter for San Pedro, and the steamer Ruth is also due at Porter to load for the city.

Port Orford Tribune: The Copper Queen, E. B. Barnes' gasoline boat lately completed at Coquille City, arrived at this port Tuesday of last week, on her way to Rogue River. The schooner Mizpah arrived from the Coquille the same evening and took on freight for parties at Gold Beach, departing the following morning, accompanied by the Copper Queen, for Rogue River. We are informed that the Mizpah will carry copper ore from Rogue River to Portland calling at Port Orford, Coquille river, Coos bay and other way ports, carrying freight to and from those places, and will make regular trips if encouraged properly. The Copper Queen will be utilized as a towboat on Rogue River, and will also make regular trips to Coos bay, calling at way ports. She is equipped with double cylinder, 40-horse power gasoline engines, and will make about 15 miles per hour. The Copper Queen arrived here from Frankport Sunday night with a raft of about 30,000 feet of lumber for P. J. Masterson, and departed the next morning for Coos bay.

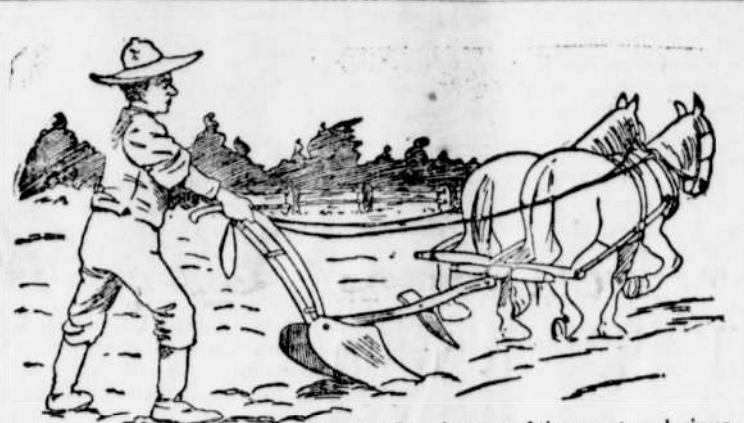
