Work on Our Bay and River.

Washington, Sept. 25.—The monthly reports of the engineer officers in Oregon and Washington for the month of August have been received by the chief of engineers.

The report of Captain W. W. Harts shows that the shoals in the Coquille river, between Coquille City and Myrtle Point, have been located, and snagging will hereafter be carried on and the shoals, as far as possible, removed. Under contract with John Kiernan, of Portland, the existing dikes in this river will be repaired and extended, the south jetty extended 315 feet, to completion, and likewise the tramway, while the north jetty will be extended 400 feet. The entrance of Coquille river is now being surveyed, with a view to further improvement.

Proposals have been invited for constructing a dike 325 feet long across the south entrance of Coos bay. This dike is designed to prevent sediment carried by Coos river from being deposited in Coos bay, opposite Marshfield, and also to assist in removing the bar at the mouth of Coos river. Work on the dike will be commenced as soon as the bids shall have been opened and the award made. Under contract with Wakefield & Jacobson, of Portland, work of extending and repairing the jetties in Coos bay will be continued and the north jetty will be completed. A survey has already been made of the bay in the locality of the jetties. The sum of \$156,725 is yet available for the work in the bay.

The jetties of the Sinslaw will be extended and repaired by Hale & Smith, Portland, under a recent contract. Snagging in Coos river will continue through September.

Salem Statesman: The record was broken at the Oregon penitentiary, yesterday, when every able-bodied man, serving time in the prison, was put to work, there being none left on the gravel path, where unemployed convicts are usually exercised. There are 308 prisoners in the institution, and all were busily engaged in work of some kind, with the exception of those disabled from work by reason of illness. The foundry is, as usual, an extremely busy place, a large number of the prisoners finding employment there.

C. P. Huntington interests have secured control of the Crocker holdings of Southern Pacific railroad stock. The shares, numbering 340,000, have an approximate value of \$10,000,000. Huntington now has absolute control of this vast railroad property.

Boers Secured Gold.

London, Oct. 4.—The most sensational news from South Africa this morning is the reiteration of yesterday's report of the acquisition by the Transvaal authorities of \$500,000 in gold, which was on the way to Cape Town from Johannesburg.

Sir William Vernon Harcourt, the distinguished liberal statesman, has another slashing attack in today's papers upon the policy of Secretary Chamberlain. He reiterated his original statement that Chamberlain's assertion that the Transvaal refused to redress grievances of the uitlanders is the reverse of the truth, and insists that Great Britain is responsible for "slamming the door in the face of President Kruger just when arrangements were approaching a settlement."

Miss Bertha Braden closed a successful term of school in the upper Catching creek district last Friday.

Two carloads of shipwrecked goods were shipped from this place to Marshfield Wednesday. They will be used in the construction of the vessel being built by Capt. Reed at Pleasant Point.

M. G. Pohl, the Sixes miner, came down from the mines Saturday. He reports forest fires raging in that vicinity and says the country is completely enshrouded in smoke, it being so dense as to prevent work. Tuesday fire broke out near the Valentine mine and it was by hard efforts that he and Robt. Harrison saved the property. The fire probably originated from the campfire.

Through the efforts of Congressman Tongue the proprietors of the Roseburg-Myrtle Point stage route have secured the following mail schedule, which is much more satisfactory than formerly: Leave Roseburg daily at 6 o'clock a. m., and arrive at Myrtle Point in 14 hours. Leave Myrtle Point daily at 6 a. m. and arrive at Roseburg in 14 hours.

The Myrtle Grange will have an old-fashioned harvest picnic Saturday, Oct. 14th. The picnic will be held in the Dixon grove, if the weather will permit, and if not, will be held in the Masonic hall. A splendid literary program has been arranged, and the Grange will put forth every effort to pleasantly entertain all who attend. Everyone is invited and requested to bring a well-filled basket.

Sheriff Jesse Turner, of Gold Beach, came in from Roseburg with Sheriff Gage Friday, bringing S. C. Gillespie, who is suspected of being the person who murdered Mrs. Edson at Gold Beach last week. Gillespie, who was arrested at Cottage Grove, will be taken to the nearest justice of the peace in Curry county for a preliminary examination, and if bound over, will be brought to Coquille City and held in jail there until court meets, as he would surely be lynched if taken to Gold Beach. Sheriff Turner did not care to disclose the evidence which he had against the prisoner, but said that from the evidence already in his possession there is not a shadow of a doubt but that he committed the crime. Gillespie while here seemed cool and self-possessed, as though entirely unconscious of the terrible charge hanging over him.
