A Sad and May Be Fatal Accident.

Last Sunday evening Johnnie Stauff, M. H. Hersey, night watchman at the mill, and Jim Whetstone were at the mill wharf awaiting the incoming of the lower-river steamer Fawn. It was growing dark, and Mr. Hersey left the company to attend his fire in the mill, while the other two paced along the wharf conversing and still looking for the coming of the boat. A little later, Mr. Whetstone, who had continued conversation at intervals, turned to where he thought Mr. Stauff was standing, but failed to see him. Supposing he had left the wharf, and not returning in sight again that he may have started home, Mr. Whetstone moved away and on meeting Mr. Hersey told him that Johnnie had left him suddenly, but still unharmed. About 9 o'clock at night Mr. Hersey heard peculiar and alarming sounds, and going to the edge of the wharf found that they came from below. He hastened to the spot and soon discovered the almost lifeless body of Johnnie, sufficiently recovered from the stunning fall as to give forth sounds and drag himself around a distance of about 20 feet and close to the edge of the water at low tide.

Mr. Hersey hurriedly summoned help and removed the injured man to the home of his sister, Mrs. W. Sinclair. Medical help was also soon at hand, but the young man lay unconscious throughout the night, all of yesterday and last night, and is at present in that state of coma and unconsciousness.

Johnnie Stauff had just returned a few days ago from Portland, we believe, and after several months' absence was stopping with his sister in this place. He is the son of George Stauff, a pioneer resident on the bay, aged about 26 years, is well known and popular, having many friends to deplore this sad accident. Coquille Academy Opened.

Prof. Andrews arrived in this city last Friday and opened the Coquille Academy yesterday—Monday—morning. Owing to delays and uncertainty concerning the date of opening and the advantages likely to be offered, the enrollment was small; but it is hoped that the many who had intended attending the academy this winter may come in promptly and begin their winter's work. Prof. Andrews comes well recommended as an efficient and very suitable man for the place. Under his management, the full academic course is retained. This course prepares students for college and requires three full years above the common school branches to complete it. The following additional courses are offered:

COUNTY CERTIFICATE COURSE. This course does thorough work in the common school branches, Oregon school law and theory and practice of teaching. It prepares thoroughly for the county examination and makes better teachers.

STATE CERTIFICATE COURSE. This course prepares candidates for successful work in examinations for state certificates.

STATE DIPLOMA COURSE. Prepares candidates thoroughly for examination for state diploma. This is a life certificate to teach in the public schools of the state, and ends the annoyance of receiving examinations. These courses are the best for this and Curry counties, for candidates can teach at intervals of a few months to help themselves through the courses. The principal offers also a complete commercial course, private tuition to a limited number of applicants in any subject in the above courses or in elocution or vocal music and class work in vocal music. These are important additions to the work of the academy. Thus it will be seen that the academy offers a larger variety of work this year than ever before. It is hoped that our people will see the benefits of patronizing the home institution, thus encouraging the continuation of a school of this class in our midst.
