A MODEL TRUST IN OHIO.
Marcus Alonzo Hanna Takes in All the Business of the Town.

Hannville, Oct. 12.—Our little city is now enjoying the advantages of the full-fledged model trust. Its entire commercial business has been concentrated on a single square, covered with a commodious building and our people are no longer required to wear out their shoes traveling all over town to do their shopping. They can do it all at a single point.

Marcus Alonzo Hanna is the good genius who has wrought this thing. He is, in fact, the whole thing in Hannville at this writing, and, as a consequence, a look of supreme happiness and contentment overspreads his benign countenance.

He is a plain blunt man, and I always like to interview him when I want the naked facts, so I gave him a whirl today and asked: "Do you think trusts are harmful, Mr. Hanna?"

"Trusts harmful?" he inquired. "Do I look as though they had harmed me? Are my clothes seedy? Are my shoes run down at the heel? Are not my business prosperous? Are not my store-rooms crowded with people who buy my goods at my own prices? If there is a man in the world who knows that the trust is a good thing, I am that man."

I readily acquiesced in the latter proposition, and asked him why he put all the business of the town into a trust.

"First, to reduce the cost of conducting the business, wipe out ruinous competition and prevent the splitting up of profits. Why throw it around in little dribs when I can take it all.

"Just look at the way things used to be done. There used to be in Hannville a dry goods store with 38 clerks, bookkeepers and employees, 3 shoe dealers with 9 clerks, 5 cobblers shops with 5 cobblers, 2 bakers and 25 hired help, 2 hatmakers with 8 clerks, 6 butchers with 20 employees, 2 hardware and implement dealers with 12 salesmen and assistants.

In other words, there were thirty-nine proprietors and 202 employees. Now there is one proprietor, 84 clerks, including bookkeepers, clerks and janitors. Here is a saving of 118 employees, which, at an average salary of \$500 a year, means a saving in money of \$70,800. Instead of thirty-nine business stands, at an average rental of \$1000, there is one of a rental of \$20,000, a saving of \$19,000. Last year the net profits of all the concerns now in the trust were \$28,000, divided among thirty-nine proprietors, an average of a little over \$3000 each.

"This year, without any throat-cutting competition, I have been able to increase the average net profits on the goods sold 33 1/2 per cent, making them \$170,666. Add to this the \$70,800 I have saved on employees wages and the \$19,000 saved on rentals and my profits are \$260,465, or more than twice as much as the net profits of the 39 men on the same volume of business and it all goes into my pocket. Don't you see how the trust works? Don't you think it is a good thing?"

I had to admit it was, and then asked him: "What is to become of the 39 proprietors and the 118 employees who are left without employment?"

"Let them go to work. That opportunity remains, doesn't it? You can see that my place is always crowded, and that I am kept busy figuring up my profits. There is work for every man if he can find it and it is willing to work. If he can't find it this week or this month let him keep on hunting for it or suffer the consequences. But the trust is a good thing. I know that it never harmed me and that is enough for me to know."

There are 1640 co-operative societies in Great Britain, with 1,500,000 members, doing a business of \$325,000,000 a year.

Commissioner Hermann, in his report, recommends the appropriation of \$70,000 for the survey of fifty townships in Oregon.

EVERY ELECTOR MUST REGISTER.
Books Will Open in January, Next Year, and Close in May.

Every elector in the state must register between the 1st Monday in January, 1900, and 5 o'clock p. m. of May 15 following. Such was the law passed by the last legislature. A voter may register before a notary public, justice of the peace or the county clerk.

Electors are not subject to expense in the matter. A book containing the registration of all voters in the county will be prepared and from this general book smaller ones will be made giving list of electors in each voting precinct. Electors will be numbered, consecutively, in each precinct, as they are entered in the general county register. The clerk shall require of the elector such information as his registration number; date of registering; full name of business or occupation; age of elector in years; country of nativity; if naturalized, the time, place and court of naturalization or declaration as evidence by the legal proof there of exhibited by the elector.

The actual and precise place of the elector at the time of his registering will be asked, and the precinct, and, if in the country, the section, township and range; in cities and towns having streets, by specifying the name of town or city, the street or other location of dwelling place, with the number of the dwelling if it has a number, and if not, then such a description of the place that it can be readily ascertained and identified. If the elector be not the head of the house it must be stated, and upon what floor thereof and what room the elector occupies in the house.

It must also be stated whether the voter is able to write his name and mark his ballot. If the elector's inability is apparent, in consequence of some physical infirmity, such as blindness or loss of a limb, incapacitating the applicant from writing, this fact must be set down in the register. Should the disability be illiteracy of the voter, the clerk shall, in addition to stating the fact, enter as full a description of the physical peculiarities of the elector as possible, giving height, approximate weight, complexion, color of eyes and any visible marks or scars and their location.

The law is very explicit, and enters into the smallest details, until after a person has gone through the process of registering he will think he is under suspicion of murder.

Should an elector change his residence after registering, he may, before the books are closed, cause his former registration to be canceled, by a request in writing to the clerk where he registered, on a specially prepared blank. Section 12 of the law says: "No person shall register who is not a qualified elector of the precinct in which he registers and who is not a resident thereof, or register in a name other than his true name; and no elector shall register a second time in the same precinct, or register in any other precinct until his first registration has been canceled."

Upon the day of election the judges, as soon as an elector applying to vote has given his name and residence, shall ask the elector if he is registered, and also examine the register. Even though a person be registered his vote may be challenged before his ballot is actually in the box. If not registered the elector is to be considered challenged. In case of a challenge, the voter may subscribe an oath, on a blank printed for the purpose, and this must also be sworn to by not more than half a dozen freeholders. In trying such cases the election judges have power to issue subpoenas to require the attendance of witnesses before them.

The last section of the law gives the following warning: "Any county clerk, or clerk of any county court, or any deputy of either of such officers, or any judge or clerk of election, or any justice of the peace or notary public, who shall wilfully disregard any of the provisions of this act, or who shall wilfully fail to perform or enforce any provisions of this act, or any person who shall wilfully or fraudulently register more than once, or register under any but his true name, or attempt to vote by personating another who is registered, contrary to the provisions of this act, or knowingly register in any precinct where he is not a resident at the time of registration, upon conviction, shall be punished by imprisonment in the penitentiary not less than one year or more than three years, or by fine not less than \$100 or more than \$200, or both such fine and imprisonment. Any person who shall falsely swear to any affidavit required by this act shall be deemed guilty of perjury and upon conviction thereof shall be punished accordingly."

For those who for any reason forgot to go to the county clerk for registration, the law enables them

to settle the matter with a notary public or justice of the peace, special blanks being provided for the purpose. These officials do not collect any fee from the elector, but receive 10 cents for every such blank filled out by the voter and filed with the county clerk—Evening Telegram.

Books Selected for the Public Schools.

Prof. J. H. Ackerman, superintendent of public instruction, has found that many teachers have compelled their pupils to purchase books for supplementary reading, when it was not the intention of the state board to have pupils purchase the books, but that the school boards should secure them for the school libraries, giving the pupils the use of them.

Prof. Ackerman has issued a circular letter (No. 25) to the county superintendents to correct his circular letter No. 24, as well as the error in Rule 8, relative to the time for holding examinations for state and county papers. The examinations will be held as follows:

"Examinations for county papers will commence at 9 o'clock on the second Wednesday of April and August, and continue three days.

"Examinations for state papers will commence at 9 o'clock on the second Wednesday of February and August and continue four days."

She is a woman of large means, about 40 years of age, and popular in the best society circles of Washington. The date for the wedding has not been fixed.

Shower of Stars Coming.
On the night of the 14th of this month there will pour from the heavens the most remarkable and spectacular stream of shooting stars ever predicted by astronomers. In Washington the scientists of the United States naval observatory are making elaborate preparations for observing the coming appearance of the Leonids, while throughout the colleges, universities and astronomical observatories of the United States and of the world thousands of men trained to a knowledge of the stars are awaiting with eager interest an opportunity to observe the grandest of celestial phenomena.—Exchange.

Commissioner Hermann's Report.

Washington, Oct. 27.—The annual report of Commissioner Hermann of the general land office, made public today, shows a grand total of 929,308,058 acres of unappropriated and reserved public lands in the United States. The disposal of public lands during the fiscal year show an increase of 728,586 acres, as compared with the aggregate of the previous year. Original homestead entries showed a decrease of 28,970 in acres involved and final entries an increase of 325,939,192 in area.
