Town Council Meeting—Important Proceedings.

Coquille City, Nov. 6.—The town council met in special session; members present—J. A. Sneed, chairman; Trustees Strang, Nosler and Balch; Marshal Goodman and Recorder McDuffee. Absent—none.

Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

The petition of C. O. Gilkey, with 79 names attached, praying for a license to sell spirituous, malt and vinous liquors in quantities less than one gallon in said town for a period of six months, the same being accompanied by a bond and \$200 in coin; and it appearing to the satisfaction of the board that the requirements of law had been complied with, it was ordered that the license be granted as prayed for in said petition, to wit: Till and including May 6, A. D. 1900.

It was moved and seconded that B street be ordered put down to grade from the railroad track to the center of Second street, original plat of Coquille City, and be planed with not less than 3-inch plank laid on stringers not less than 4x8 inches in size and not more than four feet apart, making a driveway of 24 feet wide in the center of said street, and that the sidewalks be put on grade of not more than 12 inches above said planing.

The motion was carried.

It was moved and seconded that First street, from C street to the end of the bridge east, in the original plat of Coquille City, be ordered replanked with not less than 3-inch plank, well laid on stringers not less than 4x8 inches, and not over four feet apart; and the sidewalks on both sides of said street be put to grade, to wit: Not to exceed 12 inches above said planing.

It was moved and seconded that I. Hacker be appointed to fill the vacancy in the board caused by the resignation of J. H. Cecil.

The motion was carried.

The bills of Dick Rose, for work on the streets, of \$1, was allowed; and of Ed Higley, work on streets, \$1—allowed, 75 cents.

No further business coming up, the board adjourned.
