Obituary. Samuel Barrows died Nov. 7, 1899, at his home in the north-eastern part of the town of Coquille. The funeral services were held on Thursday, Nov. 9th, at his late residence, and the sepulture took place in the Masonic cemetery of the town. Mr. Barrows was one of the oldest citizens in this part of Coos county. He was born in Kentucky, May 2, 1828, having reached the ripe age of 71 years, 6 months and 5 days. When but a small boy his parents moved to Jacksonville, Ill. From thence he and his brother, J. F. Barrows, came with their families in an early day to Kern county, Cal., where he engaged in mining, operating a quartz mill and a saw-mill. In the early spring of 1861 he left California and came overland by ox-team to Washington county, Oregon, and settled on a farm near Forest Grove, on what is known as Tuallatin plains. He remained there but three or four years, when he moved with his family to Astoria and located a farm 7 miles out from town on Lewis and Clark river. Then, about 15 years ago, he came with his family to Coquille City, near which he located on the farm where he departed this life. His wife, Julia Craig, survives him, together with one daughter, Belle, the wife of Henry Johnson, and three sons, William, Richard and John, all of whom have the deepest sympathy of many friends and neighbors in their bereavement.

Mr. Barrows was regarded as honorable in all his dealings, a man of broad sympathies, charitable, and kind of heart. He was one of the charter members of the Presbyterian church of Coquille City, but on account of the infirmities of age, was unable to attend her services. His life suitably illustrates the truth that we are but "strangers and pilgrims upon the earth," and that our enduring home is beyond. He passes on from us, in the faith of Him whose gospel hath brought life and immortality to life.
