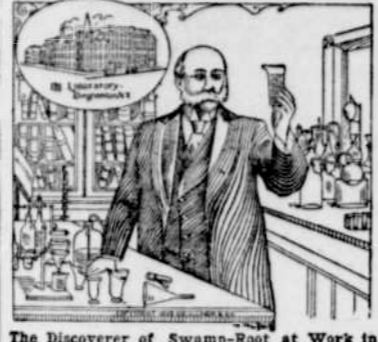

Two hundred dollars' worth of stolen goods were found on them, plunder taken by them the Sunday before being worth \$1000. They were tried and sentenced to the penitentiary for 10 years each at San Quentin, and when on the road, at Port Harford, one struck and nearly killed the deputy sheriff having him in charge and escaped. He was recaptured later, and is now being held for the result of his assault on the officer.
