Idaho Again.

The supreme court of Idaho, in denying the petition of Paul Corcoran for a writ of habeas corpus, denounces the Miners' Union for "commencing an attack upon the legally constituted authorities whenever an attempt is made to bring them to account for their unlawful, barbarous, and murderous acts."

The justices thus show their bias and unfairness, as no such acts have been brought home to the Miners' Union, which is not on trial, and the great majority of the members of which are admittedly innocent of any crime.

In addition, the court denounces "that portion of the press whose moral principles are governed and controlled by what is for their gain," well knowing that such portion of the press endorsed the prosecution of the miners and the illegal actions of the authorities, and established a virtual censorship of the dispatches, so that the facts could not be obtained until long after the occurrence.—S. F. Star.

### LIEUTENANT MONROE WORKED A BLUFF.

With Force of Only Fifty Men, He Captured General Canon's Entire Army of Over 800 and Property.

Manila, Dec. 2.—The capture by Lieutenant Monroe and 50 men of the Fourth cavalry of the Filipino general, Canon, with 800 and officers, with rifles, several American and 70 Spanish prisoners at Bayombong, in the province of Nueva Viscaya, was a successful bluff. Monroe tapped the rebel wire, telegraphed to Canon that he was advancing with a large force, and demanded his surrender. After negotiations, Canon consented to capitulate to the "superior" force, whereupon Monroe telegraphed that he would enter the town with a small guard and receive the garrison's surrender. He captured the whole Filipino rebel and secured their arms, the rebels supposing Monroe had an army behind him.

Captain Killed Himself.

Washington, Dec. 4.—The war department has received the following from Otis at Manila: "Lieutenant-Colonel Brereton, a captain of the Twenty-fourth infantry, while temporarily insane, committed suicide at Santa Tomas, Luzon, at 6 o'clock this morning. The insanity was first manifested on November 29, at Aringay."

The Cost of Government.

Washington, Dec. 4.—The secretary of the treasury today transmitted to the house of representatives estimates of the appropriations required for the service of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1901. The aggregate of the appropriations estimated is \$631,081,994, an increase over the estimates for the present fiscal year of \$38,033,616, and an increase over the appropriation for the present fiscal year of \$34,245,024.

Among the estimates for the next fiscal year are the following: Army and navy pensions, \$144,000,000; expenses of pension examining surgeons, \$1,700,000; all other expenses, \$530,282, making the total on account of pensions, \$145,230,282. This is \$3250 less than the appropriations for the current year.

### Judge vs. Jury.

It is appropriate that a federal judge from the "bull-pen" state, who recently tried a damage suit against the railroad in this city, should not only set aside the \$2250 verdict rendered, but should denounce jury verdicts generally. He would have all such cases, as to questions of fact as well as of law, decided by the judges. In this he differs from the upright and able Judge Henry C. Cardwell, also a federal judge, whose circuit includes Kansas and Missouri. Judge Cardwell holds that "twelve men of various pursuits must know more about men and affairs than one man whose whole existence is devoted to one occupation," and that "judges, as judges of the facts, have all the faults, but not all the virtues of jurors."—S. F. Star.
