Big Battle in Progress

London, Jan. 19.—(Friday, 4 a. m.)—The military critics, in addition with the war office, consider that the expected battle along the wide arc south and west of Ladysmith can hardly be delayed beyond today.

General Buller's force, engaged in a flanking operation across the Tugela, are some 13,000 or 14,000 bayonets, 1200 horses, and forty guns. The disposition of his other 15,000 or 20,000 men is not known, although the assumption is that the whole army will be in action when the hour for the combined movement arrives.

The estimates of how many men and guns the Boers have to oppose him, are guess work. In not replying to General Lyttleton's shell fire they are using the tactics that proved so successful in the battles of Magersfontein and Colenso—lying low in their trenches and thus hoping to conceal their precise position until the infantry advances.

The war office announces that next week will be embarked 72 guns—3710 men and 2210 horses. This is the largest consignment of artillery ever sent abroad.

DRAWING NEAR

London, Jan. 19.—A special dispatch from Durban, dated Wednesday, says: "Advices from Potgieter's Drift, dated yesterday (Tuesday), say that Sir Chas. Warren has arrived within seventeen miles of Ladysmith, and that the British wounded are arriving at the Moori river field hospital by every train from the front, indicating that there has already been severe fighting. Neither report has been confirmed."

It doesn't matter much; we put some into positions who before forfeited the principles they said they were promoting and fused with the Republicans to down the reform party; now let them take their medicine. Let the people of Coos county now settle this matter of "courthouse rings," and outside bosses, healers and political gamblers "fixing things."

Wm A. England, son of a former Democratic vice-presidential candidate from Indiana, and captain of volunteers in the war with Spain, has returned to the treasury a check for \$1172 sent him for his services, with the statement that he would not accept pay for service to his country in time of danger. It is the only case of the kind in the Spanish war.

In accordance with the resolutions adopted by the department of superintendence last month at Salem, Superintendent Ackerman has prepared a list of rules for examinations in common schools, and in explanation thereof has issued a circular letter to county superintendents.

Barnatt Grinberg, formerly a well-known Jewish business-man of Seattle, Wash., has been arrested in Transpoli, Gallacia, Austria, on the charge of buying girls for export to the United States.

Miss Helen Gould has contributed \$50,000 to aid in the building of the new home for the naval branch of the Young Men's Christian Association in Brooklyn.

The Senate Still Interested in the Philippines.

Washington, Jan. 16.—The senate is still in the throes of the discussion of the Philippine question, and apparently there is no near approach to deliverance upon the subject.

Vest, Democrat of Missouri, today voiced the opinion of many senators, when he said that such a discussion as was now in progress was of no consequence, as the country was confronted by a state of facts that could not be changed by talk.

Pettigrew's resolution of inquiry and Lodge's substitute for it were laid on the table today, and Hoar's general resolution of inquiry as to the facts of the Philippine war was taken up. An effort of Pettigrew to amend it, so as to call for the president's instructions, was prolonged debate. After Hoar had considered the amendments, he closed doors, the amendments were rejected by a vote of 41 to 20.

The debate for the day was concluded by Vest, who made a notable speech in opposition to the assumption in some quarters, that every man who does not agree with the policy of the administration is a traitor to his country. Vest threw into his utterances all the nervous force and energy, and accomplished oratorical ability for which he is famed, and commanded the attention of the senate throughout.

Nicaragua Canal Route.

Washington, Jan. 18.—Senator Morgan, as chairman of the senate committee of the inter-oceanic canal, today presented a written report upon the Nicaragua canal bill.

"Measured by the income of the Suez canal, at a corresponding cost, the Nicaraguan canal should yield, with equivalent rates of tolls, at least 12 per cent on \$140,000,000. "It is too severe a tax upon credit to ask the adoption of the precarious water supply at Panama, in preference to the two grand lakes of the Nicaragua route."

Will Assist.

San Francisco, Jan. 18.—The Chinese Six Companies of this city have agreed to assist the police in terminating the highlander war, which has been raging in Chinatown for some time past. Today the Six Companies subscribed \$17,500, which will be offered as a reward for the apprehension of the murderers.

Spanish Prisoners.

Barcelona, Jan. 16.—The Spanish trans-Atlantic steamer Leo XIII has arrived here from the Philippines with the former Spanish prisoners and their families. The majority of them are in a lamentable plight.
