Minutes of Dec. 28th read and approved. Communications read and placed on file.

Bills acted upon: R. S. Knowlton, stationery for recorder, allowed, \$1.15; Jack Glenn, night watchman, allowed, \$2; M. L. Tenneson, dirt at wharf property, allowed, \$15.50; J. A. Lyons estate, to balance account, allowed, \$198.26.

Now comes John Curran and presents a petition for a license to sell spirituous, malt and vinous liquors in said town in quantities less than one gallon for a period of six months, and also a bond of \$1000 and the receipt of the city treasurer for \$200; and it appearing to the satisfaction of the board that said Curran had complied with the requirements of law, on motion it was ordered that said John Curran be granted a license as prayed for to and including July 21, 1900, by the following vote: Ayes—Strang.
