POPULIST CENTRAL COMMITTEE MEETING.

County Convention Set for March 28—Precinct Primaries March 24.

The Populist central committee of Coos county met in Coquille City last Friday, Feb. 17, at call of Chairman G. G. Swan.

There was present a full committee, excepting Thomas Buckman, of Marshfield, who was detained from sickness in his family. The following members answered present: G. G. Swan, chairman; J. S. Hayes, J. P. Goodman, J. H. Matheny, O. A. Kelly, A. D. Moore; D. F. Dean, secretary.

Minutes of previous meetings were read and approved. A conference committee from the Democratic central committee, also in session in Coquille City, composed of Hon. S. H. Hazard and D. J. Lowe, announced as in waiting to confer in regard to the Populist and Democratic parties joining forces in the next campaign was, on motion, admitted to be given a hearing in regard to the proposition they wished to make, which proposition read as follows: "The members of the Democratic central committee are in favor of leaving the question of the union of the Democratic and Populist parties, or non-union, to the respective parties at their precinct primaries, and that the voters are hereby requested to certify the result of each vote to their respective conventions, and that the mode and terms of union be determined by the respective conventions."

It was then moved and seconded that the aforesaid proposition be adopted. Carried.

POPULIST COUNTY CONVENTION.

Moved and seconded that the Populist county convention meet at Coquille City, Oregon, Wednesday, March 28, 1900, at the hour of 11 o'clock a. m. Carried.

PRECINCT PRIMARIES.

Moved and seconded that the Populist primaries be held in the various voting precincts on Saturday, March 24, 1900, at 1 o'clock p. m. Carried.

Said primaries are for the purpose of electing delegates to attend the above-mentioned county convention, nominate road supervisors and other precinct officers, and vote on the question of union or non-union with the Democratic party.

Moved and seconded, that there be one delegate-at-large elected in each precinct, and one for each 20 voters and for each major fraction thereof in each voting precinct to represent the respective precincts at said county convention. Carried.

The following is the list of voting precincts and the pro-rata of delegates to which they are entitled: Delegates: South Marshfield..... 5 North Marshfield..... 4 Coquille City..... 11 Norway..... 5 Empire..... 2 Riverton..... 4 Two-Mile..... 2 Parkersburg..... 4 Barton Prairie..... 2 Newport..... 3 Prosper..... 2 Coaledo..... 2 Missouri..... 3 Sumner..... 2 Rowland..... 3 Myrtle Point..... 8 Dora..... 2 North Coos River..... 3 South Coos River..... 4 Bandon..... 7 Lake..... 2 Deer Park..... 1 Ten-Mile..... 2 Coos City..... 1 South Slough..... 3 Enchanted..... 2

Moved and seconded that the delegates to said county convention be elected by ballot. The foregoing minutes were then approved.
