The Road Question from a Californian's Standpoint.

Ed. Herald: This is my first winter in Oregon. I am an immigrant from California, "The land of sunshine," and there where the roads are naturally good, thousands of dollars are annually spent to make them better. This matter of roads is the most serious objection I have at the present time to this country.

Our road is the Bandon road, up Fishtrap creek. The mud is deep and no bottom. The earth seems to have no foundation; if it has, the wheels cannot reach it. If this is the condition of the roads all over the state of Oregon, God help the people.

"God helps those who help themselves." I have faith in that adage. I believe we have power to help ourselves. Our people are burning enough timber every year to plank all the public roads in the county. Is it not possible that the county officials, whose duty it is to "construct and maintain" county roads may be induced to move in this matter? A good many of the people in this vicinity are in favor of plank roads, and would contribute liberally in labor toward its construction, and all whom I have talked with think the county should own a portable sawmill. I know that it would not cost the county one cent for the timber to make plank for four miles from the river. Some one has argued that plank would not do. This is simply folly. There is not a baby in Coos county who will live long enough to see a good red-cedar board rot. In this matter I should be glad to see everyone do something. I have learned through the Herald that in Tillamook county the county owns a portable sawmill and the lumber costs the county a little over a dollar a thousand and, surely we can plank a road at those rates.

[Coos Bay News.] Eleven carloads of lumber are at the depot from Johnson's mill, awaiting the arrival of a vessel. Butter from the Aerea creamery, Humboldt, was received on the Homer, and sells in town at 55 cents per roll.

The Homer took matchwood from the S. O. and Henry Sengstacken to Portland, this trip. She also took apples and a quantity of other freight.

The Homer will probably go the Pribilof islands next month for seal hides. If so, the Del Norte will take her place on this route, or the Alliance, if she doesn't go on the Alaska run.

Two large four-masted vessels are to be built in Marshfield immediately for Hooper & Co., of San Francisco. T. S. Minot received a letter from E. Heuckendorf, who is to be master builder, this morning, and later received a dispatch confirming the statement. The vessels will be about 20 feet longer than the J. L. Evison, and are intended for foreign trade.

Notice of Street Improvements.

BY ORDER OF THE BOARD OF Trustees of the Town of Coquille City, County of Coos, State of Oregon: Notice is hereby given that at a meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Town of Coquille City, Coos county, state of Oregon, held on the 24th day of December, A. D. 1899, it was ordered that B street, from the railroad track on First street, to the center of the crossing of Second street, all in the original plat of Coquille City, be put to grade and planked from sidewalk to sidewalk, with not less than three inch planking, well laid and spiked on stringers four by eight inches and laid flat, said stringers to be not more than four feet apart and slightly raised in the center of the street, with good and substantial box drains at the edge of sidewalk, to be water, and the sidewalks to be put down to conform to said grade and planking.

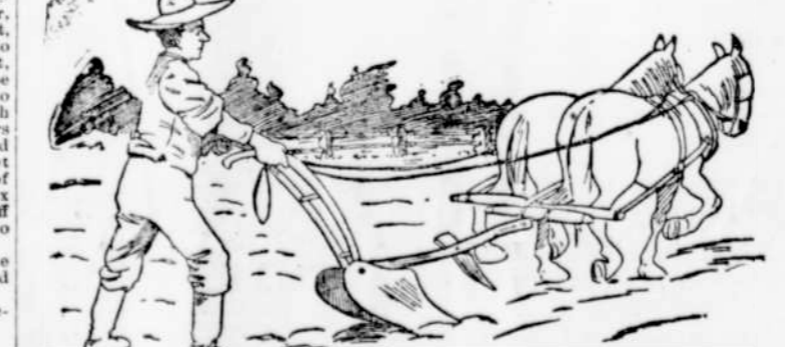
