Washington, March 12.—Representative Sulzer, of New York, today introduced the following resolution: "Resolved, etc., that the secretary of war is hereby directed to inform the house of representatives, as early as possible, what fortifications Great Britain is erecting, constructing and completing along the northern frontier of the United States, especially at Puget sound and other places on the Pacific ocean, contiguous to the state of Washington and the district of Alaska."

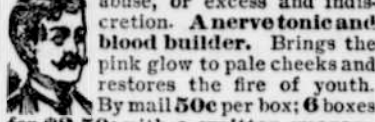
