Washington, March 28.—President McKinley, Governor Nash of Ohio, Secretary of State Hay, and other distinguished Ohioans will go to California to be present at the launching of the battleship Ohio during the middle of the summer.

GENERAL JOUBERT IS DEAD.

Age and Hardships on the Field of Battle Probably Caused Fatal Illness.

Pretoria, March 28.—General Joubert died last night at 11:30 o'clock. He had been suffering from stomach complaint. The town is plunged into mourning for the true patriot, gallant general and upright and honorable gentleman.

General Pietrus Jacob Joubert, commandant general of the Transvaal forces, better known as Piet Joubert, or Siliem Peter, was born about 80 years ago. He was born in Cape Colony, and was taught from early childhood to shoot straight and to hate the British.

He was elected vice-president of the Transvaal in 1896. He defeated Sir George Colley at Majuba Hill in 1881, and acted as president of the republic in 1883-84 during President Kruger's absence in Europe.

BOERS READY FOR ROBERTS. Pretoria, March 26.—United States Consul Hay and his secretary have gone to Kroonstadt to make the necessary arrangements for United States representation in the Free State.

A dispatch received here from Boer headquarters in Natal, announces that destruction continues of coal mines likely to be useful to the British. The Dundee colliery has been blown up, machinery destroyed, and the mine rendered useless for three months to come.

According to a dispatch from Kroonstadt, Commandant Olivier has joined Generals Groebler and Lemmer, who are safe. General Delary is still sick at Pretoria, but he will proceed to the front Sunday.

Traus are frequently leaving with burghers for the fighting line on this side of Bloemfontein. The Standard and Diggers News says it learns that Generals Olivier, Groebler and Lemmer have arrived at a point sufficiently far north to relieve all apprehension of the possibility of being shut off.

The Boer Hero.

New York, March 30.—A World correspondent, writing from Pretoria, March 27th says: "The Boer army has thus far been strengthened by about 3000 men, who have come into the country through Delagoa bay since the war began. This large body of men has been recruited chiefly in Europe, but many have come from America and even Australia."

MUST AWAIT ACTION OF THE GRAND JURY.

Court Refused to Honor Taylor's Pardon and Prisoner is Denied Bail.

Frankfort, Ky., March 27.—The fourth day of the trial of Republican Secretary of State Powers began with the courtroom cleared of all people excepting attorneys, newspaper correspondents and officers of the court.

The attorneys for the defense held a consultation, after which Governor Brown, for the defense, announced that no testimony would be introduced for the defense, and that they would waive further examination. The pardon issued to Powers by Governor Taylor was tendered by Brown as a bar to prosecution, and he asked that the defendant be dismissed.

Colonel Campbell said the commonwealth denied Taylor's right to issue a pardon. Brown moved that the prisoner be dismissed upon the evidence. The motion was overruled. Bail was asked for. Judge Moore said: "It is not my belief that Powers fired the shot which killed Goebel, but on the evidence, it is my opinion that he was connected with a conspiracy to kill him."

After the Powers case had been disposed of the court recessed until 2 p. m.

A snagboat is to be taken from Coos bay to the Coquille river, to remove rocks at the mouth of the river. When this is done, snags will be removed between the mouth of the river and Myrtle Point. She will also dig out shoals in the upper part of the river, above Arago. Below Arago work of this character is not necessary.

At Coos bay excellent progress has been made. Twenty-one new bents have been placed in the jetty. These bents are some 16 feet apart, so the jetty has been lengthened about 550 feet.
