Populist Convention and Nominations.

A large, enthusiastic and good-natured assembly of delegates to the county Populist convention met in the little church last Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock. Quite promptly Chairman G. G. Swan of the county committee called the meeting to order, and K. H. Hansen, of Missouri precinct, was chosen temporary secretary. On motion, a committee of three—W. D. Marshall, J. S. McEwen and Hon. Thos. Buckman—was appointed as a committee on credentials, and a recess taken till the committee should report.

On reassembling, the committee on credentials reported as follows: New Lake—James Cope and E. A. Friend (Cope holding proxy of Friend).

Riverton—O. A. Kelly, W. H. Hull, W. H. Waddington and A. Dahuff.

Upon announcement, on motion, J. S. McEwen was elected permanent chairman of the convention, K. H. Hansen, secretary, and A. Dahuff, assistant secretary.

R. D. Sanford presented a series of three resolutions, first, that no fusion be entered into by the Populists of Coos county with any party, which was carried on ballot, 37 for resolution and 26 against. Second resolution provided that the convention nominate no one for office who had held the same office for two terms. Carried—for, 32 votes; against, 31 votes. The third resolution was somewhat ambiguous and was therefore laid on the table.

A committee of five on order of business—D. Giles, G. G. Swan, Joel Patterson, W. H. Waddington, and Thos. Buckman—was then appointed and a short recess taken.

AT 2:30 P. M. The committee reported a list of officers to be voted for at June election in the order hereinafter acted upon:

Joint Senator, 7th district—(recommended subject to endorsement of Curry county), Hon. Thos. Buckman received 35 votes, and A. Dahuff, 22 votes.

Representative, 5th district, Coos county—R. D. Sanford, by acclamation.

Joint Representative, 7th district, Coos and Curry—left to Curry county.

Sheriff—W. H. Hull, K. H. Hansen, Taylor Weekly and H. W. Dunham were placed in nomination. On second ballot, Capt. H. W. Dunham was declared the nominee.

County Clerk—K. H. Hansen and Geo. Ross were placed in nomination. Geo. Ross was nominated by vote of 36 to 17.

County Treasurer—Z. T. Johnson, W. H. Wigant and D. Giles were balloted on. Daniel Giles was declared the nominee, having received 38 votes.

Assessor—(second ballot, Chas. Watson and W. S. Volkmar withdrawing their names), M. J. Krantz was declared the nominee.

County School Superintendent—The chair was instructed to cast a ballot for K. H. Hansen.

County Surveyor and Coroner—Left for county committee to fill. County Commissioner—On 2d ballot, J. H. Matheny, I. T. Johnson, Thos. Johnson and J. P. Goodman were balloted for, Mr. Matheny receiving the nomination and so declared.
