The boat is a beauty, and will undoubtedly fulfil the expectations of her experienced owners and designers, as well as of the builder. The work is of the best, substantial and neat, and she has been christened "Favorite." Beyond a doubt she will prove a favorite in speed, safety and management, for three of our best river craftsmen are the owners, and they are each popular and well-known citizens, good and careful business men, enterprising and obliging. She is 77 feet in length, with 15-foot beam and 52-inch propeller. She has a compound engine, with a 12x16 low pressure cylinder and 8x12 high pressure.

An interesting case was brought from Marshfield before our Justice W. C. Chase last Friday, entitled The State vs Beattie Collison, assault and battery upon one A. B. Wilson, a 10-year-old pupil in her school. The local justice, Judge Hyde, was disqualified from trial of the case, owing to being a witness, hence the change of venue to Coquille City. The hearing took place in the circuit courtroom and was largely attended by witnesses and friends of the parties from Marshfield, as also by many citizens of Coquille, ladies and gentlemen, who took an interest in the case. Trial was called at 11 o'clock a. m., and defendant entered plea of not guilty. The case was then continued till 1 o'clock p. m., when it went to trial, John S. Coke and A. J. Sherwood appearing for defendant and T. S. Minot for the state. A large number of witnesses were heard, including scholars of the school, Principal Jorden and teachers, and members of the school board, and resulted in Justice Chase dismissing the case and discharging the defendant, Miss Collison.
