Thirty-Five Persons Killed—Many Wounded and Will Die.

Tacoma, Wash., July 3.—A Tacoma car, carrying 104 excursionists, jumped the track on a curve at 8:30 this morning and plunged off a bridge into a gulch 120 feet.

Pekin's Streets Literally Running with Blood.

The following are extracts from dispatches of the 6th inst: The streets of Pekin are literally running with blood from the victims of Boxer butcheries.

It is now known that China has long been preparing for the trouble, ten million dollars worth of arms and ammunition having been captured and destroyed in and about Tien Tsin.

London, July 7.—"The massacre of the foreign ministers, the women and children, and the guards at Pekin, after 18 days of hopeless resistance, is confirmed," says a news agency dispatch from Shanghai, dated July 6 and received in London today.

"When the ammunition and food were exhausted," continues the dispatch, "the Chinese fiends closed in upon the legations and butchered all who remained alive."

The dispatch does not state the source from which the news of this confirmation is received, but it is thought that this is indicated by another Shanghai dispatch which states that the Taoti, or officer in charge of several departments at Shanghai and vicinity, now admits that no legations exist in Pekin.

Reports of the atrocities committed by Prince Tuan upon the Chinese are appalling. He had 4000 Chinese butchered, it is said, for merely daring to petition to control the orgie of blood and restrain his followers.

Oregon National Guard.

The Oregon National Guard consists of the following: Two regiments and one battalion infantry, twenty companies, 1200 men.

Three battalions naval reserve, 150 men. One battery light artillery, 60 men: Two troops cavalry, 100.

Total, 1510 men. These troops are better equipped than ever before and have been ordered into eight-day encampment at Salem beginning July 7th.

The camp has been named Camp "Geer," in honor of the governor, who is commander in chief of the National Guard.

About 50 persons are employed in the Salem cannery, which is now canning peas.
