Attempted Suicide. The following we take from the Eel River Valley Advance, and the persons referred to are members of Al Markham's company which performed in this place a few weeks ago: Chas. Bates, who played the Irish comedian in "Ole Olsen, Jr." attempted to take his life at the Star Hotel Wednesday just after noon. That he was not successful was because the knife used was too small to reach the heart.

According to the lady's story Bates again asked her to marry him and when she told him it was impossible and started to leave the room he caught her by the wrist, locked the door and put the key in his pocket. He then opened his pen knife and told her he would kill her. Instead, however, he drove the blade into his own side three times. The wounds were all below the heart and only resulted in the spilling of considerable blood. Miss Seymour took the key from Bates' pocket, unlocked the door, called for help and then fainted. Dr. Steele was at once summoned. He found Bates sitting on the side of the bed, his clothing saturated with blood and looking like a demented being. The doctor soon stopped the flow of blood and after dressing the wounds put the man to bed. He was not able to appear at the evening performance, but Thursday morning he proceeded to Ferndale with the company.

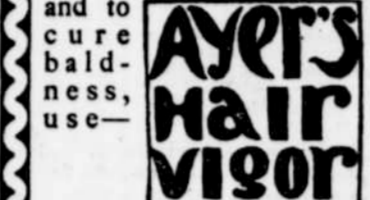
