

Peace Comes to all Somoa. Washington, Aug. 31.—The Navy Department has received an interesting letter from Commander B. F. Tilley, commanding the United States Naval Station at Tutuila, describing the promising conditions in the American section of the Samoan Islands, and recounting the impressive ceremonies attending the unveiling of a monument to the American and English dead who fell in the shore engagement there in July, 1899.

Another Capsizing on the Bar. In relating the story of the capsizing of the fishing boat of James Costello and W. M. Vandecar on the bar at the mouth of the Coquille last week, the Recorder gave the following which is to the credit of our life-saving crew. Keeper Johnson and the life saving crew did some quick work although the parties were upon the jetty before they got there. The keeper and his crew launch their boat and reached the scene in less than four minutes after the incident happened. Of course the keeper and crew were ready as Keeper Johnson was watching the boat through a field glass, while part of the crew had already gone to the boat and donned their cork jackets.

Our District Fair. While our fair was not the success which it ought to have been, and what it will be with the proper amount of energy and enterprise put forth, it was by no means a failure. There were something like fifteen hundred or two thousand people in attendance. Good music was furnished, the weather was perfect and all went off nicely. The exhibits in the pavilion were numerous and varied, but not altogether what ought to have been there. As a matter of course our farmers and dairymen are a very busy class, and for this reason their industries were neglected at the fair if not at home.

Robert Ennis, of Coquille City, and there was quite a large attendance of friends of this popular young couple. After the ceremony the party was invited to partake of a bountiful repast spread by the parents of the bride.

United States and Russian Troops Retire. London, Aug. 31.—The afternoon papers today appear to be preoccupied at the American-Russian accord to secure the prompt evacuation of Peking. They point out how completely this upsets preconceived notions of the grouping of the powers on the Chinese question and the consensus of London's editorial opinion is that the proposals are antagonistic to British interests, and that the allies should remain in Peking until the Chinese government is re-established and the ringleaders of the present uprising are punished.

Of the conditions, Commander Tilley says: "I am glad to report that everything connected with the new government is progressing in a most satisfactory manner in all the islands. The natives show much interest in the new methods of government, and they are striving to learn and to comply with my wishes. The general condition of the people could not be more satisfactory. They are quiet everywhere, and are improving their roads, cleaning up their villages and their surroundings, and planting their gardens and plantations. Prosperity for the islands seems fully assured."

A Bark in Distress. The Chilean bark Pacifico, which sailed from Port Blakeley on July 10th with a cargo of lumber for Valparaiso is on the Pacific somewhere in a partly dismasted condition. The American ship St. David, which arrived this morning from New York, spoke the vessel on August 6th in latitude 27.35 degrees north and longitude 132.20 degrees west. The Pacific's foremast and foremast head, the latter three feet below the cap, were gone and the bark was sailing close-hauled. The St. David signaled the bark but the only answer she received was a display of the Chilean flag. The Pacific had on board when she left Port Blakeley 529,246 feet of lumber.

Boers Still on the Retreat. London, Aug. 31.—Lord Roberts, under date of Belfast, August 29, reports to the war office as follows: "Buller telegraphs from Halvetin that only a few of the enemy are there, and that this morning French's and Pole-Carew's forces will move on their flank. The advance of Dundonald's mounted troops on their front caused them to abandon a very strong position. The country thus cleared, our troops moved eastward. The South African Light Horse, after little opposition, entered Watervalvohven and drove the remnant of the enemy through the town."

In passing N. Lorenz's store Tuesday our attention was attracted by some nice cranberries displayed in the window. Upon making inquiry we learned that they came from the Johnson ranch two miles below town Mr. Johnson planted two beds aggregating 40x50 feet, and this year the yield from this patch was over 225 gallons. Pekin Ministers and Relief Forces Disagree. Taku, Aug. 28, via Shanghai, Aug. 30.—There is much recrimination between the foreigners besieged in Peking and the members of the relieving force. Officers say that the besieged sent out alarmist reports and that the condition of the foreigners was never one of such extremities as the official dispatches represented. The foreigners, they assert, could have resisted indefinitely. The besieged accuse the generals of timidity and of exaggerating the Chinese opposition. They think a much smaller army might have made the mark and relieved them months sooner.
