Duties of Local Advisory Boards

We give the following set of rules governing the advisory boards of the Oregon Children's Home Society appointed in the different localities to manage the business pertaining to these boards, and to show to the public what is expected of such boards, to give all a chance to do what may come under their notice in the way of finding a home for any little waif needing the attention of this institution:

1. To organize at once upon appointment, by the election of president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer.

2. To receive and report to the proper headquarters the case of a homeless child.

3. To accept a child in case of an emergency, subject to the approval of the state superintendent.

4. To receive and report applications for children.

5. To give information and supply blank application papers and other requisites when solicited.

6. To report as to the character, standing and financial ability of a family applying for a child, obtaining satisfactory testimonials from reliable sources.

7. To obtain in writing, when so directed by the state superintendent, the legal surrender of a child offered the association.

8. To discreetly supervise the work of the society within the local jurisdiction, and give such assistance as may be in their power to the superintendents or agents of the society; and especially to report at once to proper headquarters any case of neglect or abuse of a child.

9. To receive donations when necessary for the society, and to remit the same without delay to the proper authority, keeping a correct list of donors.

10. To aid in the circulation of Children's Home Finder, and other literature of the society.

11. To keep correct minutes of their proceedings and a record of all children placed within their jurisdiction; also a record showing when and by whom children have been transferred.

12. To report in writing any matter of importance not specified in the above rules.

13. To promptly notify the state superintendent of the removal of any family having a child of the society, giving, if possible, their new address.

A Natural Refrigerator in Summer. Hundreds of people are visiting a hole in the side of the mountain near Coudersport, in Potter county, which must be a delightful place in hot weather. The hole was dug by a man in search of mineral wealth. The farther he dug the colder became the atmosphere. At the depth of 20 feet he was compelled to quit. The peculiarity of this mine is that about May ice begins to form in it and continues to freeze until October. There is no ice in the hole in winter. The warmer the day the more ice there is in the mine. On approaching the opening on a hot day a strong current of cold air is felt. This air becomes more frigid the closer one goes to the cavern. There is no water at the bottom of the shaft, but the water dripping down from its sides freezes. The ice begins to form less than a foot from the top and coats the sides of the shaft several inches thick. What causes the intense cold and where the air comes from are questions that have not been satisfactorily answered.—Philadelphia Press.

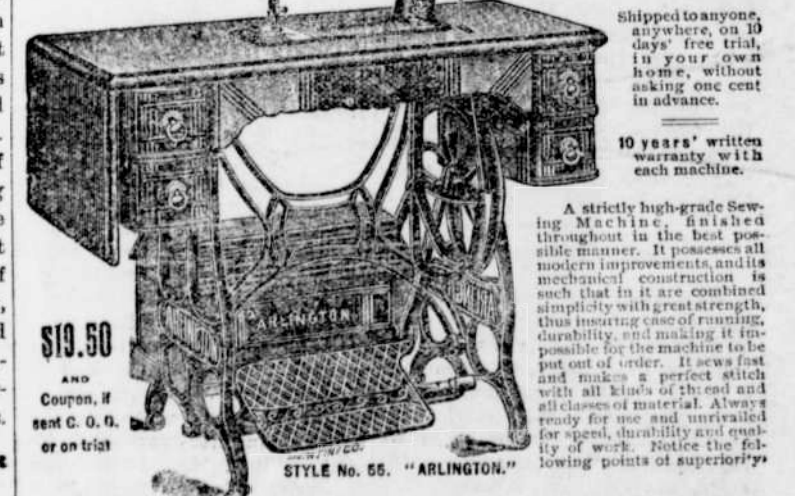
