Endicott, of Myrtle Point has just received advices from the patent office at Washington that a patent has been granted on a device of his invention which promises to become a useful, in fact an indispensable article of commerce. The instrument is designed at all times, regardless of the weather to retain the proper tension or strain on the tire of wagon wheels. An accurate description of the device would be impossible at this writing as we have not yet seen the model, but suffice it to say that it has been thoroughly tested at the patent office, and is found to be capable, if necessary, to give the rim within the tire a pressure of 20 tons, or it can be slackened till the tire may be removed with the hands, and this can be done with an ordinary wrench. Mr. Endicott was assisted by Hon. E. Hermann as well as his son, Schiller, a leading merchant in Myrtle Point, in securing his patent which has been granted only a short time, and it is safe to say that it will not be long till this useful article will be on the market.
