Jas. L. Furnish writes the "Pacific Homestead" from Ada, Or., as follows: Between the Siuslaw and Umpqua river is a chain of fresh water lakes, five in number, and there is some talk of connecting these links with the Umpqua by means of a canal, but it is only talk as yet.

Around Tenmile, Fifemile and Threemile lakes are some fine bodies of spruce and fir timber, owned by mill companies. East of and tributary to these lakes are a number of good sized streams, with narrow valleys containing as fine land as there is in Oregon, and an ideal place for dairying and stock raising.

The bottom lands grow fine crops of hay and vegetables, while any of the hills or bench land will grow good grass especially clover, which will grow just as well or better on bench land.

Most of the land near the lakes is low hills, suitable for grain or clover, and will raise good gardens if well plowed and fertilized. On the Siuslaw, at Acme, three miles above Florence, is a creamery owned by O. W. Hurd, and Warren Reed has one on the Umpqua, at Gardiner, and many of the settlers here deliver butter to these creameries in the granular state, the roads being as yet too bad to deliver milk.

On the rivers the creamery men run milk boats and collect the milk and cream. Some of the ranchers have separators run by water power. Goats do well here, and men who own them say they are less bother and just as profitable as cattle, basing this statement on the amount of money invested.

Bear and cougar have a hankering for goat meat, but a pack of dogs and a gun soon spoil their appetite. We have no coyotes here, and we suppose that if any stay over across the Coast range they get salmoned the same as a dog, and die.

This country doesn't get so dry in summer as the Willamette valley, for we have very heavy dews here nearly every night in the summer, and we are only a few miles from the Pacific.
