A Good Idea From Missouri.

St. Joseph, or "St. Joe," as people hereabout call it, has not generally been considered a particularly brilliant town. It is noted, for instance, as having been the residence of Jesse James, the train-robbler, for a long time, and to have possessed no officers of sufficient nerve and prowess to apprehend him; while he went cheerfully on collecting tolls from passengers and express messengers on the adjacent railroads. Finally this iron-highway-robber had to be killed by a boy—relative, who had been hired to become a member of the outlaw's family, got into his confidence, and shoot him while his back was turned. The boy was promptly tried, convicted of murder, and sentenced to be hanged was then pardoned by the governor of the state, and became for a time one of the bright and shining lights of the dime museum sky.

These incidents, and this manner of arresting criminals, were of no particular credit to St. Joseph, although perhaps she did the best she could under the circumstances. But she has now partially redeemed herself by an act which, if copied by other cities, will immortalize her. In connection with the public schools of the city, night ones are conducted and if any boy is seen on the streets after nightfall, he is bundled into one of these schools, and made to behave himself and learn something besides rascality.

In doing this, St. Joseph has done a great deal toward reducing the Jesse-James-outcrop of the country. And if the adolescent worst-than-illers that throng the streets of our eastern cities can be treated the same way, it will work a revolution in public morality.—Every Where.
