The following estimates for the improvement of rivers and harbors in the Northwest have been made: Coquille river, Oregon, \$65,000; Siuslaw river, Or., \$35,000; Canal at Cascades, Columbia river, Or., \$90,000; Willamette river above Portland, Or., \$30,000; Columbia river and lower Willamette below Portland, Or., \$325,000; mouth of the Columbia river, Oregon and Washington, \$600,000; Grays Harbor, Wash., \$265,000; Puget sound and tributary waters, \$25,000; Olympia harbor, \$25,000; waterway connecting Puget sound with lakes Union and Washington, \$125,000.

The loggers in British Columbia have troubles of their own. They claim the mills do not always give them the best of a log-scaling deal. The appointment of a compulsory log-scaler is being discussed. Oregon has no state scaler, while Washington has, but the results indicate that the law of supply and demand is the only true arbiter of values.

Mrs. Mark slipped and fell on the stone walk, at her residence, Friday, receiving injuries which confine her to the house.

The dimensions of the new vessel, being built at North Bend, are Length, 174 feet; beam, 40 feet; depth of hold, 14 feet.

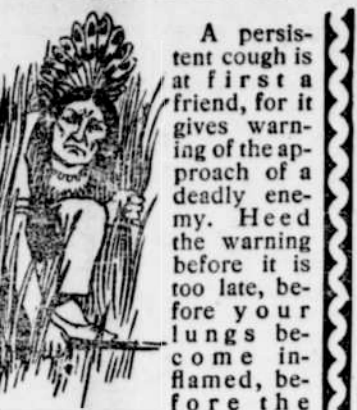

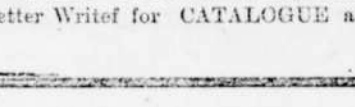
