## Landgrabbers Win.

The decision of Commissioner Hermsman reversing that of the local land office in the Lakeview district, with regard to the ownership of certain Warner valley lands, is unfortunate, to say the least. Its effect is to confirm the title to large tracts of land to a gang of landgrabbers, who, and others like them, have already profited far too much at the expense of settlers and taxpayers. Oregon is so large and prosperous a commonwealth that it does not feel the loss of these lands; but it is nevertheless an injury and an injustice, that scores of settlers should thus be despoiled and deprived of homes that they have built up through many toilsome years, for the benefit of an organization of swamplandgrabbers.

This is but a continuation of an old story, and a part of the most disgraceful one that stains the annals of our state. Old Oregonians are familiar with the system by which the "swamp angels" possessed themselves of large areas of soil, and how a few have grown rich, if not insolent, in consequence of this injustice. "Swamp land," in the old days, was any unoccupied territory in Oregon, within 40 miles of a pond or pool of water, but the "swamp angels" and other landgrabbers have generally had their way, and won a victory in the courts, and the department, as it seems they have finally done again in the Warner valley case.—Ex.

## House Passed the Groat Oil Bill.

Washington, Dec. 7.—The House today passed the Groat oleomargarine bill by a vote of 196 to 92. The substitute offered by the minority of the committee on agriculture, which imposed additional restrictions on the sale of oleomargarine to prevent its fraudulent sale as butter and increased the penalties for violators, was defeated by a vote of 113 to 178. The bill as passed makes all articles known as oleomargarine, butterine, imitation butter or imitation cheese, transported into any state or territory for consumption or sale, subject to police power of such state or territory from forbidding the transportation or sale of such product when produced and sold free from coloration in imitation of butter. The bill increases the tax on oleo colored in imitation of butter from 2c to 10c per pound and decreases the tax on oleo uncolored from 2c to one-fourth of a cent per pound.

A long and interesting debate preceded the vote, in course of which those who favored the Groat bill claimed the additional tax on colored oleomargarine was the only effective remedy for preventing fraud upon the public, while those who opposed it contended that fraud would be prevented by the substitute and that the real purpose of the Groat bill was to destroy the oleo industry.

## County Surveyor W. F. Briggs on his return trip from the Elkton and Coos county survey met with quite a severe accident, about 2 1/2 miles north of this place.

In going down a steep grade in the road the leather connecting the neck yoke and tongue gave way and let the pole drop to the ground. The buggy ran on to the horses heels, frightening them and they became unmanageable and ran away throwing Mr. Briggs violently to the ground. Mr. Wm. Jackson was at the time in the buggy with him, but by a lucky jump made his escape without sustaining any injury. Jackson immediately went after aid to assist Mr. Briggs home. Dr. Downing, of Riddle, was called in and on examination he found that his ribs broken and his hip badly bruised. Mr. Briggs is now at home and receiving the very best of treatment, but it will be some time before he is able to do much work.—D. B. in Roseburg Review.

## Great Gathering at Washington's Centennial Celebration.

Washington, Dec. 12.—The National Capitol is in gala attire in celebration of the 100th anniversary of the establishment of the federal government at Washington. Business, public and private, is suspended, while the president and his cabinet, the senate and house of representatives, the federal judiciary, the governors of many states and territories, and a great concourse of citizens and visitors joined in the elaborate festivities of the day. Perhaps never again will this generation witness such a significant gathering of the heads of states.

One hundred years ago the transfer of the seat of government was made from Philadelphia to Washington, and the site previously selected by President Washington was taken possession of by the various branches of government, President and Mrs. Adams driving over from Philadelphia, the senate and house holding their sessions here for the first time. For months Washington has been preparing for a fitting commemoration of this interesting historical event, and the celebration today is designed to bring out the development which a century has brought forth both in the capital and in the nation.

## England's Coal Problem.

The importation of coal from the United States has added to the growing uneasiness of the English public. Coal is the foundation of England's commercial supremacy, and the nation is now confronted with the fact that its mines can no longer supply, at a reasonable price, all the coal that is needed for home consumption and for the existing export trade. To curtail home consumption would be to close factories, while to forbid coal exports would be to strike a serious blow at the shipping trade and to endanger England's commercial supremacy on the seas. While the country is hesitating between the horns of this dilemma the price of coal is rising so high that it threatens to inflict severe suffering on the poor during the coming winter.—Chicago Tribune.

## All Agreed to the Joint Note.

London, Dec. 12.—The negotiations of the powers in regard to the joint China note were concluded satisfactorily yesterday, all agreeing to the conditions identically as outlined by Count von Bulow the Imperial Chancellor of Germany, November 19, with the exception of the introductory clause saying the demands are irrevocable, which is eliminated.

## London, Dec. 10.—The Daily Mail has received the following mail from its Calcutta correspondent:

The Porto commissioners recently invited tenders for locomotives. The lowest English tender quoted \$1544 for each locomotive and wanted nine months to complete the order. The lowest American tender quoted \$1260, and asked for six months. The latter was accepted, subject to the approval of the government.

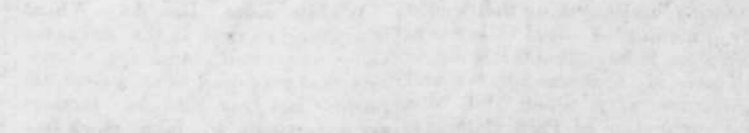

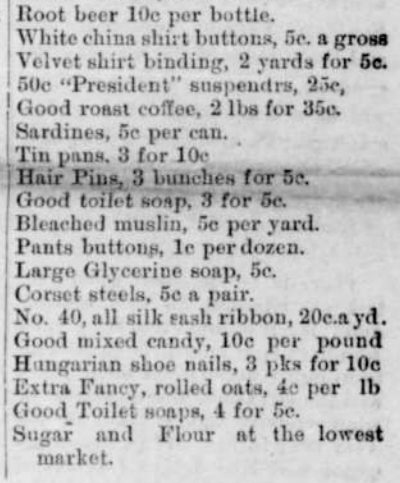
