In the Coos Bay County.

Elton, Or., March 2.—(Special Correspondence.)—Eureka! A country worth fighting for is worth living in, so thought Alexander, when he married Roxana, the daughter of Darius, and settled down to house-keeping in his conquered empire. The Israelites before him evidently were animated by the same desire when they settled down in Canaan. But fortunate for those ancient adventurers stage lines and corduroy roads were luxuries unknown to them, lest I fear, the spirit of conquest would have received a severe check, and they would have felt not unlike the average commercial traveler who, after 40 miles of travel by stage into the modern Canaan (a term applicable to Coos Bay), finds himself a bruised, mud-bespattered bit of humanity, with all conceit and desire for colonization knocked out of him. But there is some satisfaction in the fact of having braved discomforts of the trip and in finding one's self still among the living in this out-of-the-way land, which, not unlike Canaan, flows with milk and honey.

"Tillamook" wrote a correspondent once to the Examiner, "is a country all by itself, fenced in one side by the ocean and by mountains on the other; where a man may sit on a fence all day without being disturbed by a peddler of assessor, listening to the song of the sea, eating clams and growing fat." That was 15 years ago, and it was then applicable to the Coos Bay country as well. But conditions have changed since then, save in one respect, the roads; these have remained the same, if not worse.

This condition is a scandal to our system of roadbuilding. "I have been over this road often within the past 20 years," said a commercial traveler, "and I have never seen it in worse condition."

We left Drain at 5:30 A. M., and arrived at Elktion, a distance of 16 miles, at 12:30 P. M., after walking many miles in preference to riding, and also because the team of four horses was unable to pull the load of eight men through the sticky mud offtimes axle deep. The only sign of improvement was about a mile and a half of new corduroy up a mountain side. In many places, instead of the water draining off, it ran in rivulets over the road, washing out deep ruts, or again causing a swampy condition over a large area, through which the poor animals had to founder belly deep.

And this a mail route and stage route, the only one now open for travel from the Southern Pacific railroad to tidewater!

And this condition the same today as it was 20 years ago! A melancholy reflection, and one that will not improve the situation, even at the expense of the most superfluous expressions on the part of the traveling public paying a good round price for the experience.

A general system of state or United States Government roadbuilding in a thing much needed, but as Utopian of realization as many other needful things.

The work of the permanent settler is in evidence all along the road between Drain and Elktion. Farms with plowed and seeded ground, orchards and meadowland and clearings along the hillside indicate progress, though slow, and the many pretty farmhouses are evidence of permanence and prosperity.

This is an ideal dairy and stock country, and with better roads a much speedier development might be expected.

This section might profit by following Tillamook's example, building plank roads through the mountains by means of portable saw mill, where timber can be had in such abundance all along the road.

Elktion is a pretty hamlet near the confluence of Elk Creek (now a formidable stream) with the Umpqua River. It has an ax-hauling factory, blacksmith shop, a commodious, new and attractive public school building, about 90 pupils attending. Two general stores, a good hotel and a few fine residences; daily mail connection with Drain and Marshfield. But the peace of the inhabitants is not disturbed by either telegraph or telephone.

O'erhill and dale and hamlet fair A pastoral quiet pervades the air.

Palatability we must have, as we cannot succeed without it. How can we secure it? With out hay it can be obtained by cutting at the proper time and curing and protecting it in a proper manner. My experience teaches me that the clovers, and especially the medium clover, make the best hay for milk cows, when cut at the proper time and well cured and secured.

Creameries are of no benefit to a neighborhood unless there are a sufficient number of cows to supply the milk necessary to run them economically and successfully. The best of our creamery men differ in regard to the number of cows necessary to run one, and no definite number can be easily fixed upon, for the reason that some cows will give more milk than others and some farmers feed more generously than others. I would not advise the construction of a creamery where there are less than 500 cows in the immediate vicinity. Before building a creamery, farmers should look this matter firmly in the face, procure the cows, and learn how to manage them. Then they can safely go ahead.
