We had the pleasure of examining the model of the three masted schooner to be built at Parkersburg as rapidly as possible, as we came up the river Thursday. The vessel will have a length of keel of about 124 feet and breadth of beam of 34 1/2 feet and depth of hold of 8 1/2 feet. Master Builder Danielson tells us that he will begin his labors in a week or so, and that the work in the yard would be uninterfered by the first of May. While we do not claim to be a judge of models or to know much about vessels, we have reason to believe that this will be the best vessel of the kind ever built on the Coquille river. Her depth will be little if any greater than that of the small schooners now running to this river, while her carrying capacity will be more than double theirs while the difference in expense of running the vessel is very slight. This is a very enterprising move on the part of the Coquille Mill & Tug Co., for which they should be congratulated. This company have begun operations on the building of a large and commodious hotel upon the site of the store building which was destroyed by fire a short time ago. This house will be conducted for the accommodation of the traveling public as well as the employes of the mill and at the shipyard, and will be conducted by Mrs. Emil Lewin, formerly of this place, which is equivalent to saying it will be conducted in first-class style.

County Exhibits at the State Fair. The liberal premiums offered for county exhibits at the Oregon State Fair this year will afford every county in the state an opportunity to exhibit her resources. There is no question about the great number of homeseekers coming to the state this year, and the State Fair will afford them an excellent opportunity to judge for themselves of our resources. For this reason alone every county that makes any pretension to general agriculture should make a good showing. The premiums offered on county exhibits is \$1,000, divided into five parts, as follows: First premium, \$300; second premium, \$250, third premium \$200; fourth premium, \$150; fifth premium, \$100. The Southern Pacific Company hauls all exhibits to and from the fair free of charge, and a very liberal rate is made on all other lines in the eastern portion of the state.
