Body of Late Senator A. W. Reed is Recovered.

Roseburg, April 5.—There is little doubt among the friends and acquaintances of the late State Senator A. W. Reed, who was drowned, together with Fish Commissioner Hollister D. McGuire, in the Umpqua river nearly two years ago, that a body found in that stream near Oakland last Saturday was his.

"We, the jury impaneled to inquire into the identity of the body found in the Umpqua River, at a point some 12 miles northwest of Oakland, Friday March 30, 1901, and also as to the cause of the death, find as follows: The deceased was a male person, past the age of 35 years, about 5 feet 8 inches or 5 feet 9 inches in height and weighing 150 pounds or more; that we are unable to determine the direct cause of his death, but that the indication point to drowning; that his identity cannot be fully determined, but that to the best of our knowledge and belief, substantiated by the fragment of trousers, white shirt and under-clothing found upon the remains, and identified by an expert merchant tailor as being of similar quality and kind to that worn by Albert W. Reed, former State Senator from Douglas County, and from the location of the remains when found, some 30 miles below where Mr. Reed was drowned about two years ago, and also from the measurement of bones of the deceased, that the body found as above stated was that of Mr. Reed.

"E. H. Pinkerton, foreman; C. L. Chenoweth, L. S. Dimmick, S. L. Dimmick, F. W. Roach."

Some persons believed the body to be that of Godfred Bolling, who mysteriously disappeared about a year ago, and who is generally believed to have been murdered and thrown into the river, but the measurements of the bones and length of the trunk would indicate that the deceased had been a much larger man than Mr. Bolling. The pieces of clothing adhering to the body also tended to disprove the theories of Mr. Bolling's friends and from their quality and kind strengthen the belief that they formed a part of the raiment Mr. Reed wore at the time of his death.
