Silo Stave and Hoops. Ed. Hoard's Dairyman—Kindly advise through your paper the number of hoops 2 1/2 x 4 inch, I wish on a 12 ft. in diameter by 25 ft. high, round tub silo. Plank to be sawed 2 1/2 inches and then dressed and beveled. Some say it is useless to plane and bevel? What is the general opinion? Also which is the best, round iron or flat hoop? What keeps a tub silo from falling over when empty? W. D. K. Philadelphia, N. Y.

A silo can be built from rough lumber and be tight for the first year, but there is no guaranty that it will remain tight for any length of time. The better a silo is built, the longer it will last, the less spoilage will be found and the less will be the loss of feeding value. Round iron is usually used for hoops, because it is cheaper; otherwise there is but little choice. In stave silos the shrinking of the staves when empty, is liable to cause a collapse, unless staves are tightened.

The bottom hoops should be six inches from bottom; second hoop, two feet from first; third hoop, two and one-half feet first; the distance between hoops being increased by 1/2 foot, until they are 3 1/2 feet apart, which distance should be maintained. Do not draw hoops tight till silo is filled, and the staves had a chance to expand; then tighten to the proper point.—Hoard's Dairyman.
