 Pure Food and Dairy Law.

Following is an excerpt from the law enacted by our late legislature in which our people will feel most interested in as dairymen, dealers in and users of dairy products:

Section 1. That at the general election held in June, 1904, and every four years thereafter, there shall be elected by the electors of the State of Oregon a "commissioner," who shall hold his office for a term of four years, and until his successor is elected and qualified, who shall qualify within thirty days from the time of his election, by taking and filing an oath to faithfully perform the duties of said office with the Secretary of State, who shall receive for his salary the sum of eighteen hundred dollars (\$1,800) per year and his actual traveling expenses incurred in the discharge of the duties of his office, not to exceed twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200) per year; provided, that the present Dairy and Food Commissioner, elected at the general election held in June 1900, shall continue to hold said office until his successor shall be elected and qualified as provided in this act, and shall have all the power and perform all duties of the Dairy and Food Commissioner herein provided, and the expense fund of twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200) per year herein provided, for shall be available from and after March 1, 1901. Said commissioner may at any time after March 1, 1901, appoint one deputy, who shall take and file with the Secretary of State an oath to faithfully perform the duties of his office, who shall receive a salary of nine hundred dollars (\$900) per year, who shall hold office during the pleasure of said commissioner, and whose duties shall be prescribed by said commissioner. The said commissioner may also appoint other deputies, who shall take and file a like oath, and shall hold their office during the pleasure of the commissioner, and who shall be compensated by the commissioner. It shall be the duty of said commissioner to visit and inspect, in person or by deputy, every creamery and cheese factory operated within the State of Oregon as often as possible and not less than once in each year; and he shall also visit and inspect as often as possible the dairy herds of the state, and the methods of feeding, caring for and stabling of the same. The person elected as Dairy and Food Commissioner shall be well qualified in dairy matters and qualified to give theoretical instructions in dairying; and it shall be the duty of said commissioner to give practical and theoretical instructions in dairy matters whenever and wherever opportunity offers within the state, and to collect and disseminate such information as is calculated to develop the dairy industry within the state. The said commissioner shall establish his office in the City of Portland in this state, and shall, upon complaint being made by any citizen of the State of Oregon, or without such complaint if in his opinion necessary, examine his duty each of violation or supposed violation of the provisions of this act, or any of them. He shall keep a full and correct account of all business done by him or his deputy or experts, chemists or agents, and report the same to the legislature.

Section 2. No person or persons shall sell or expose for sale or exchange, or have in his or their possession for sale or exchange, any adulterated food, drink, medicine or fertilizer, unless the same shall be plainly marked so as to establish its true character and distinguish it from a pure article of food, drink, medicine or fertilizer. In any public dining or eating room where adulterated food or drinks are used, the bill of fare shall state the fact in the same sized type as is used in printing the body of said bill of fare, or if no bill of fare is used, then and in that case printed notices thereof shall be posted a conspicuous place in said dining or eating room so as to be easily seen by any one entering such room, in which notice shall be stated in large letters the fact that adulterated foods and drinks are being used for food or for food and drink. It shall be unlawful for any person to offer or expose for sale reworked butter or mixed butter, unless the same is plainly marked "process butter," and it shall be unlawful for any person to offer or expose for sale any tub or packed butter remolded into prints or rolls or squares, unless the same is plainly marked "tub butter," and it shall be unlawful for any person who offers or exposes for sale reworked, mixed or remolded butter to mark or brand said butter with the stamp of any creamery or with the words "creamery butter," and it shall be unlawful to sell or offer or expose for sale any diseased, unclean, impure or un-

wholesome food, drink or medicine of any description.

Section 3. An article of food or drink or medicine shall be deemed to be adulterated within the meaning of this act when: Any substances have been mixed with it so as to reduce or lower or injuriously affect its quality or strength. If any inferior or cheaper substances have been substituted wholly or in part for it. If any valuable constituent has been wholly or in part abstracted from it. If it is an imitation of or is sold under the name of another article. If it is colored, coated, powdered or polished, whereby damage is concealed, or if it is made to appear better, or of greater value as compared with the total solids, than it really is; provided however, that salt and annatto, or butter color in which annatto is the principal ingredient, shall not be considered an adulteration when used in dairy products. Butter that contains more than fourteen per cent water. Milk that contains less than three per cent butter fat. Milk that contains less than nine per cent solids, other than butter fat, and less than 1.638 specific gravity after cream has been removed. Jellies, jams and fruit sauces put up for sale that contain any other ingredient than pure fruit substance and juice. Apple cider vinegar that contains an acidity of less than four per cent of absolute acetic acid and one and one half per cent cider vinegar solids, or that is made of anything else than absolute apple cider. Pickles and fruit sauces shall contain no other sweetening matter than pure sugar.

Section 4. No person, by himself, under, manufacture, sell or offer for sale, expose for sale, take orders for future delivery, or have in his possession with intent to sell, as butter any article, product or compound made wholly or partly out of any fat, oil, oleaginous substance or compound thereof not directly or wholly produced from pure unadulterated milk or cream of the same, which has been or is colored to imitate yellow butter produced from pure unadulterated milk or cream of the same; provided, that nothing in this act shall be so construed as to prohibit the manufacture and sale of oleomargarine in a separate and distinct form, and in such manner as will advise the consumer of its real character, free from coloring matter and ingredients causing it to look like butter.

Section 5. Any persons, firm, association or corporation who shall within the State of Oregon manufacture butter under the separator process for sale in said state, shall apply to the Oregon Dairy and Food Commissioner for a stencil or plate, with the number of the creamery and the name of the manufacturer and where manufactured, and the words "Oregon Creamery Butter, full weight," and on each box of butter so manufactured for sale in the State of Oregon there shall be an impression from said stencil, or said plate shall be attached thereto, and each roll or square of butter so manufactured for sale in the state of Oregon shall bear a wrapper upon which shall be the words "Oregon Creamery Butter, full weight," and the number of ounces in such roll or square.

Section 6. Every person or persons, firm, association or corporation who shall, at any creamery; cheese factory or private dairy, manufacture cheese in the State of Oregon, shall, at the place of manufacture, brand distinctly and durably on the bandage of every cheese and box containing the same the true grade of said cheese, as follows, to wit: "Oregon Full-cream Cheese," or "Oregon Half-skimmed Cheese," or "Oregon Quarter-skimmed Cheese," or "Oregon Skimmed Cheese," as the case may be. Full-cream cheese shall contain not less than thirty per cent butter fat; cheese that contains fifteen per cent butter fat, and under thirty per cent, shall be known as "Half-skimmed" cheese; cheese that contains seven and a half per cent butter fat, and under fifteen per cent, shall be known as "Quarter-skimmed" cheese; cheese that contains less than seven and a half per cent butter fat shall be known as "Skimmed" cheese; provided, nothing in this section shall be construed to apply to "Edam," "Brieckstein," "Pineapple," "Limberger," "Swiss," or hand-made cheese, not made by the ordinary Cheddar process.

Section 7. Each square or roll of butter kept, exposed or offered for sale in the State of Oregon, which is represented to contain one pound in weight, shall contain full fifteen ounces; and each square or roll of butter kept or offered for sale in the State of Oregon, which shall be represented to contain two pounds in weight, shall contain full thirty-two ounces.

Section 8. Every person, persons, firm or corporation, or voluntary association, who shall manufacture cheese in the State of Oregon, shall apply to the Oregon Dairy and Food Commissioner for a stencil giving number of factory, quality or grade of cheese, as provided in section 6 of this act, the name of the manufacturer and the county in which the said cheese is manufactured; and each box of cheese sold, or offered for sale, shall bear an impression from said stencil.

Section 9. When any person, persons, firm, corporation or voluntary association shall apply to the Oregon Dairy and Food Commis-

sioner for a stencil or plate as is in this act provided, the said commissioner shall furnish the same, and shall make a charge of \$1.00 for each stencil or plate so furnished.

**A GOLDEN WEDDING.**  
 Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Krewson Celebrate Their Fiftieth Wedding Anniversary.

On last Friday evening, in response to upward of one hundred invitations sent out to the families of their many friends, a large assemblage of our town-people gathered at the Christian church of this city to participate in the celebration of the fiftieth wedding anniversary of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Krewson. The church was well filled with the newly-made friends of this estimable old couple since their short residence in this place, at the appointed hour, and Rev. J. M. Hunter took the occasion as master of ceremonies. The exercises were opened with song and prayer. Then a few appropriate songs, recitations, etc. were rendered before the presentation ceremony.

Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Smith, of Riverton, who had passed their fiftieth wedding anniversary only a few days previous were special guests of the occasion and recipients of a beautiful present at the hands of the Christian congregation.

The presents were as follows: Large gold-lined silver fruit basket, by the congregation of the Christian church of Coquille, a pie knife by Mr. and Mrs. H. T. Schwiers, a gold-spoon by Rev. and Mrs. Brink and a pair each of golden spectacles by their children. Mr. and Mrs. Smith received a similar fruit basket that of Mr. and Mrs. Krewson. The presentations were made by Rev. J. M. Hunter, in a very impressive and pathetic manner.

After the program, presentations, etc., a bountiful supper was spread. Two tables the full length of seating portion of the building fairly groaned under their burden of delicacies of which all partook to their full satisfaction. This was an evening of enjoyment long to be remembered by this venerable couple as well as a large circle of friends.

J. W. Krewson was born in Livingston county, Ohio, March 16, 1832. At the age of 14 years he removed with his father's family to LaSalle county, Illinois, where he was married to Miss Ann E. Miles on May 1851. They moved from Illinois to Benton county, Iowa in 1862. In 1863 he enlisted in the 11 Iowa infantry and served until the end of the Rebellion. In 1866 he moved to Oregon and settled on the present site of Drain, Douglas county, and has lived there ever since until about one year ago when he moved to Coquille. Mr. Krewson laid the first foundation, established the first store, was the first postmaster, first railroad agent, and built the first grist mill in Drain, they being pioneers in the fullest sense of the terms. They are the parents of seven children four of whom are now living. The oldest son Orrin is in Idaho. Thomas Krewson, Mrs. G. W. Harry and Mrs. L. L. Lantz, of Coquille. They have 37 grand children and 6 great grand children.
