Hon. W. F. Benjamin Passes Away.

Hon. W. F. Benjamin, a widely known citizen of Roseburg and Douglas county, died at his home in this city at 12:30 a. m. Sunday, May 12, 1901, after a long illness, aged 74 years, 2 months and 10 days.

Mr. Benjamin always took an active interest in public affairs and held a number of positions of honor and trust. Among the more important we may enumerate the following: In 1876 he was elected a member of the Oregon legislature from Douglas county. In 1878 he was appointed register of the U. S. land office at Roseburg, which position he held for two terms. In 1886 he was again elected to represent Douglas county in the state legislature and took a leading part in the work of that body. In 1891 he was appointed postmaster at Roseburg, in which position was given his last work in the public service.

His fraternal circles he also took great interest and was long a member of the Odd Fellows, including its branches, and also of the Masonic order, where his work was always for their advancement in a fraternal and material way.

The funeral was held this afternoon from residence, conducted by Philatrus Lodge No. 8, I. O. O. F., including appropriate addresses by Hon. J. C. Fullerton, and District Attorney Geo. M. Brown, and the body was laid to final rest in the L. O. O. F. cemetery. The services were also attended by Union Encampment No. 9, I. O. O. F., and a large concourse of citizens, testifying the esteem in which he was held as a citizen and a neighbor. A long and busy life is ended and another familiar form will be missed from our streets, to be with us no more forever. May he rest in peace.—Roseburg Review.
