FOUL MURDER NEAR COQUILLE.

Jesse B. Eudaily Dies at the Hands of a Brutal Murderer Near Town.

Early Saturday morning our usually quiet little city was thrown into intense excitement as the facts of a foul murder were made known to our citizens. It seems that the evening before a body had been discovered and the facts made known to the officers who took proper action in the matter, but little was made public till Saturday morning. Upon investigation an envelope was found upon the body which led to his identification, bearing the name J. B. Eudaily, and which had been posted at Blackwell, Oklahoma. There was also a money order receipt for \$11, the order for which had been issued at the same place on Nov. 28, 1900. Further investigation revealed the facts that J. B. Eudaily worked for George Yoakam at his camp on Coos river for about four months being paid off on Saturday, one week previously, and started this way on his return home in Oklahoma on Sunday morning. Nothing more was noticed out of the ordinary until Friday morning when Robert and Grover McQuigg were hunting salmonberries in a thicket near the railroad track just below Cedar Point when they discovered a man in the midst of the thicket very busily engaged digging in the ground with a shovel. The boys seeing they were not observed by the man went on their way, thinking little more of it. Late in the afternoon of the same day they went near the same spot to drive up the cows and while there concluded to investigate and see what the man could have been doing digging in so secluded a place, and, in a moment were at the spot and proceeded to dig down where fresh dirt indicated the work of the man they had seen. On digging about ten inches or a foot deep they came to a man's pants, and, as a matter of course, became somewhat alarmed and ran home as quickly as possible and told their story to their parents, whereupon Jesse McQuigg came to town to notify the officers while the little boys with their father and others went to the scene of suspected body. By eight o'clock Deputy Sheriff Gallier and Justice Cecil and others from town arrived and proceeded to investigate further when the body was taken up and brought to town and placed in the small empty house of Allen Collier near the railroad cut. Here a thorough examination of the body was made which showed that the deceased had been shot in the forehead above the right eye, the ball ranging slightly downward and passing out of the left temple near the corner of the eye.

Following are the members of the coroner's jury empaneled by Justice Cecil, acting coroner who inquired into the case under the direction of Deputy District Attorney Sinclair: J. W. Krewson, A. Flanders, L. R. Hughes, W. C. Rose, L. P. Maury and R. E. Buck, who found the following verdict:
 In Coroner's Court, in Coquille, Oregon, held by J. H. Cecil, justice of the peace and acting coroner, on May 25, 1901.
 We, the jury empaneled to inquire into the cause of the death of a man found murdered near Cedar Point, find, after carefully hearing the evidence in the case and examining the body that his name is Jesse B. Eudaily, that he was hurried in a shallow hole in the brush, and that he came to his death by a gunshot wound in the head, and that we believe, by the evidence produced before us, that the shot was fired by one M. D. Landis. Signed.

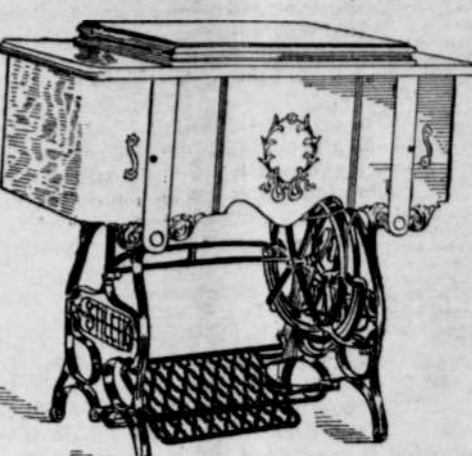

Telegrams were sent to the mother of the deceased who wished the body embalmed and shipped home, but the body was too much advanced in decomposition, making this impossible, it being evident that the murder was committed on Sunday the 19th inst. There is much evidence to warrant the coroner's jury in finding the verdict they did, and the suspected man is still at large. This is a thing very much to be deplored and the county court is offering \$250 reward for this man and Sheriff Gallier adds \$100 more. There is a large number of men scouring the woods in the direction Landis started, and it is to be hoped he will be overtaken and brought to justice. The motive for so bold and audacious a crime cannot be surmised by our people. The deceased was a stranger in this section, as was also the accused, the latter having made his first appearance in this county last season canvassing for the Home Comfort steel range and delivering later on. He spent the winter in California. When Landis first heard that the body of a man had been found near town he appeared very nervous and went at once to view the corps, and in a very short time was out of town and on the road towards Marshfield. Jack Glenn followed him as far as Coos City keeping an eye on him but about this place lost track of him.
