Electric Light Franchise.

An ordinance granting certain privileges and authority to Frank Morse, of Ukiah, California, and to his heirs, administrators and assigns in relation to the use of the streets, alleys, ways, and public places in the City of Coquille, Oregon, for the erection and operation of an electric light system.

The people of the City of Coquille do ordain as follows:

Section 1. That Frank Morse of Ukiah, California, his heirs and assigns are hereby granted the right, privilege and authority upon the terms and conditions hereinafter contained, for a period of twenty years, the first five of which shall be exclusive, to enter upon, construct, operate, and maintain in, through, over, and across, any and all of the streets, avenues, highways, bridges, approaches, public ways and places of the said City of Coquille, a system of poles and wires, and all other necessary and useful appliances for the manufacture, production, use, and transmission of electricity and for furnishing the same to the consumers for the purpose of lighting, whether for the use of the said City or any or all inhabitants thereof, or for any or all companies, corporations and persons in said City of Coquille, provided, that the said grant shall not interfere with any individual lighting his own premises with electricity and providing his or their own apparatus therefor, and if necessary in lighting all of said individual's premises, to cross the streets and alleys of said City with his wires and poles for said purpose.

Section 2. That the said Frank Morse, his heirs, successors, or assigns, shall enter upon the construction of the said system and plant within six months after the approval of this ordinance and shall complete and have in operation the said system and plant on or before the first day of December, 1901.

Section 3. That the failure of the said Frank Morse, his heirs, administrators or assigns to comply with the foregoing section two of this ordinance, shall work and operate as a forfeiture of the rights, privileges, and authority herein granted.

Section 4. That the said Frank Morse, his heirs, administrators, executors and assigns, are hereby required to use all reasonable diligence in providing a continuous, regular and uninterrupted service of said system for and during the period of this franchise.

Section 5. That the maximum rates which the said Frank Morse, his heirs, administrators or assigns shall be allowed to charge, except by consent of the Common Council, shall be as follows, to-wit:

For lights of thirty-two candle power, all night service for streets, \$1.50 per month;

For lights of sixteen candle power, all night service, \$1 per month;

For lights, sixteen candle power to midnight, for saloons, 75c. per month;

For lights, sixteen candle power, for stores, ten-thirty service, 50c. per month;

For residences, a graduated rate for sixteen candle power as follows: one light, 50c. per month; two lights, 90c. per month; three lights, \$1.20 per month; four lights, \$1.45 per month; five lights, \$1.65 per month; and for all additional lights over and above five the rate shall be 15c. per month.

Section 6. That the Common Council shall have the right to specify the height and location of all poles to be used in said electric light system, and no poles shall be erected without the said poles and the places of their location having been approved by the Common Council; provided, that all poles placed on Front or Main street, shall be not less than twenty-five feet above the street, and the poles placed on all other streets of the said City of Coquille, shall be not less than twenty feet above the surface of the street.

Section 7. Should the said Frank Morse, his heirs, administrators or assigns fail, honestly and faithfully, to perform any and all of the terms and conditions of this ordinance, the Common Council of the said City of Coquille may, at its option, declare this franchise forfeited and may remove all poles and wires from the streets, alleys and thoroughfares of said City.

Section 8. This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after its approval by the Mayor.
