Fish by the Ton.

Our local sports have had their inning and the result has been tons of fish caught by the hook and line.

James Costello and W. M. Vandecar went outside to the fishing grounds last Monday, and met with splendid success. The catch represented 22 halibut, 4 ling, and 3 red fish, being 29 in all. The largest halibut weighed from 45 to 50 lbs.

On the next morning Captain Butler and crew, of the tug Triumph and Tom Lewis, Peter Nelson and Donald Charleson went outside to the fishing ground on the tug and Keeper Johnson and crew from the station went out afterwards in the surfboat.

The station crew came in first in the evening having caught 14 halibut, 9 ling, 3 salmon and 2 redfish, making a total of 28 fish.

A few minutes later the tug steamed up to the wharf with the largest amount of fish ever taken here at one catch with the hook and line.

The tug's crew and their associates, seven in all, had taken 157 halibut, 10 ling and 6 redfish, in all, 173 representing a weight of about three tons. The largest of the halibut taken weighed about 80 pounds.

This day's fishing was a success and beats all past records at this place. There was fish for everybody.—Bandon Recorder.
