Several witnesses were examined and Erickson was found guilty as charged and was fined \$20 and costs, thus going to prove that it does not always end the matter for an aggressor in such cases to go to a friendly justice and plead guilty. A. J. Sherwood assisted in the prosecution and W. U. Douglas was attorney for the defendant.
