FLORENCE CRITTENTON REFUGE HOME.
 Asks immediate Assistance for the Erection of a Permanent Building.

During the last five years the Florence Crittenton Refuge Home of Portland has suffered greatly in point of health and comfort as well as in facilities for a thorough and systematic industrial training of its inmates. We were forced into the present "temporary structure," by a restriction placed upon us by the legislature, requiring us to move to the acre donated to us by Mrs. W. M. Ladd, before we could draw the state funds which had been appropriated to us at the session of that year. But one legislative term had passed before the appropriation was again withheld through the failure of the legislature to organize for business, the year of the noted "hold up." The struggle to meet current expenses since then has made it impossible for us to raise funds for a building.

Our current expenses being provided for the present, by an appropriation from the state, it behooves us to turn our attention at once to raising funds for the new home. For the last two years we have had an average family of fifteen adults per month and ten infants, and the condition of our present temporary structure makes it absolutely necessary for the health and well being of the family that we have a building before the coming winter.

We have two acres of ground in a good state of cultivation, which is free from all encumbrance; and current expense being provided for, with no doubt whatever, we come to the friends of philanthropy for the money to build a house where the sanitary arrangements will be such as to protect health and life, and with such conveniences in the way of suitable room as will make it possible to train and equip the unfortunate class for which we care. It avails but little to rescue these unfortunate ones unless they are so trained and disciplined as to enable them to earn a living by honest and useful employment. The service of these girls is needed in many homes, and such homes can be provided with competent and reliable servants, if they have the training such as our plans propose. Give us the building, and we hope to demonstrate a success beyond anything we have yet reached in this line. We have sent out an average of one girl each month for the last two years or more, that could be safely called reliable and competent in their line, besides many others of less competency. Many of these have gone to representative homes in our city. More than twenty others have married, and are successfully presiding over homes of their own.

We ask for \$25,000 for the proposed building and necessary equipments. Let your sums be such as your prosperity and our crying need calls for.

Letter From the Philippines.

The following is a portion of a letter recently received by Mrs. R. G. McQuigg from her brother, Brett Clark, who is yet in the islands in the service of Uncle Sam:

COTABATO, Mindanao, April 24, 1901.
 MY DEAR SISTER:

Yours of February 14th was received over two weeks ago while we were in Siasi but we received orders to move, and during our packing up I had no opportunity to write, but now we are settled down again and I have time to turn around, so will try to answer your most welcome letter. We left Siasi on April 13th and landed here the 17th. This is about 300 miles from Siasi and 150 from Zamboanga, on the southeast corner of the island of Mindanao. This place has a population of about 25,000, composed of Moros, Filipinos, Feteries, Chinese, Spaniards and Tagalogs. It is situated on the Rio Grande river about 5 or 6 miles from its mouth. The country in the immediate vicinity is very flat and swampy and the town itself is but a few inches above sea level. When the tide floods the water runs through the gutters in the streets washing out all trash twice every twenty-four hours. The river valley is about 75 miles wide and very fertile. U. S. gunboats have been up the river about 100 miles and could go further. On each side of the valley are high ranges of mountains. The active volcano Apfel is in plain sight and we can see the flames from it every night. The people here appear to be very friendly, but these people are not to be trusted.

CONSPIRACY TO OVERTHROW THE REPUBLIC OF FRANCE.

London, July 19.—The Pall Mall Gazette today publishes a communication from its correspondent, giving circumstantial details of an alleged conspiracy to overthrow the French Republic and install Prince Louis Napoleon as Emperor. The correspondent is assured that September 14, upon which date the Czar intends to promote Prince Louis to a full Generalship in the Russian army, has been selected as the occasion for a demonstration to support the claims of this Prince, who is such a close friend of the Russian ally of France.

The names of M. De Roulede, the Marquis de Lur-Saluces and M. Marcel-Habert are mentioned as the leading spirits of the movement, and several high functionaries of the present government are alleged to be assisting the plot with funds.

United States to Retain Morro Castle.

New York, July 19.—In addition to the other bases of supplies demanded in the Platt amendment it is the intention of the Administration to retain permanently Morro Castle overlooking the harbor of Havana. This, the Washington correspondent of the World says is announced on the highest authority. It is the intention to occupy the stronghold with United States troops after the government of the island has been handed over to the Cubans. The plan is to equip the fortress with modern artillery so that Cuba may be assisted in defending herself against outside interference, and also that the United States may thus have guarantee against failure on the part of the Cuban Government to carry out its pledges and terms of the treaty now in course of preparation as between this country Cuba. Under this treaty the retention of the fortress is provided for.
