Zahn, formerly a prominent Roseburg baker, was in town Wednesday looking for a location, and has decided to cast his lot with us. He went at once to Roseburg to get his effects and is now here again. He will occupy a building in a prominent location on Front street and will conduct a bakery of the first class. F. E. Clayton, of near Bandon, arrived from Portland Thursday, having come down on the Alliance and over from the bay by rail, bringing with him the necessary machinery to add a sawmill to his broombundle factory, consisting of a good and substantial sawframe and a pair of 48 inch double circulars and the necessary shafting, etc., which will be a big addition to his enterprise. James Murray, of John Bear's livery stable at Marshfield, was over to this valley Wednesday in quest of hay. He tells us that they are compelled to send to San Francisco for a great deal of the hay used in that barn, and pay a good price for it, too. It seems to us that our farmers are missing a good thing when they allow hay to be shipped from California to Coos county at the prices the bay people are compelled to pay. At the Ship Yard.

It is now expected that the new four masted schooner will be launched on August 7th. The vessel will leave the bay with 6,000 large piles for San Francisco. This will, when accomplished, leaves nearly \$70,000 directly in the hands of laborers at Marshfield, all within 4 months' time. The small steamer being built will also leave about \$20,000 among the laborers of Marshfield. In all, this company will expend at least \$100,000 during the first six months of the new corporation. The directors of the company contemplate putting in a compressed air plant for driving spikes, trenails, etc. The directors also contemplate enlarging the yard. Work is being pushed on the steamer but it is expected that the work may be delayed owing to the machinists' strike in San Francisco.— Coast Mail.

BORN.—At Rosa's mill, July 24, to Mr. and Mrs. Charles Chaudler a daughter. Captain John Jorgensen is to rig and be master of the new schooner now being built at Parkersburg. Captain P. Ellingson will take charge of the schooner Parkersburg. A letter received a few days ago from W. V. Cope who is in Alaska, conveyed the intelligence that he is doing well, and that he would make his reappearance in Carry shortly after the geese migrates southward. Superintendent W. H. Baneh was in town Thursday evening of last week on his way to visit the schools of Southwestern Coos. From him we learn that he has arrangements pretty well completed for the Teacher's Institute which convenes here August 5, 6, 7 and 8th. The Hotel at this place will give teachers reduced rates and the usual reductions have been given by the transportation companies. C. W. Hess, a former resident of this place, accompanied by his family, has been camping in Bandon for a few days. They have not slept in a house for some months, having been traveling during that time. They left Roseburg last Spring and traveled into North-eastern Washington and then returned. Mr. Hess is thinking of locating at Coquille and intended going there to day. The Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints will hold a re-union, or series of meetings at Bandon, August 16 to 25th. Members of the Bandon Branch, residing at different points in Coos and Douglas county and other parts of this district are expected to be in attendance. It is possible that Joseph Loff, one of the apostles, will be present, and Elder A. M. Chase who visited this section on three or four former occasions is expected to be here. Port Orford Tribune: Last Saturday at noon, two gentlemen, strangers, coming up the coast, on arriving at Mussel creek, went out to take a look at the Corbin mill company's new wharf, now under construction, and which extends considerable distance out through the surf. While looking down into the water from the end of the wharf they were surprised to see the body of a man some distance down in the water. While watching it the body floated up almost to the surface, and the men could plainly see that it was the body of a man, with the head and one hand missing. They immediately started for the mill, a mile distant, and notified the men, who were at dinner. A number returned to the wharf, and as diligent a search as possible was made, but the body had floated away and could not be found. The body is undoubtedly that of one of the Strahan boys or Theodore Fleming, who were recently drowned at Cape Blanco reef, and will probably soon be found on the beach if a close watch is kept.
