F. M. Gevrez, one of our pro-gressive farmers of Cunningham, handed us samples of a new variety of barley of his raising which is certainly far ahead of anything we have ever seen in the barley line. It is completely bullish, the seed coming out of the chaff as clean as a grain of wheat, a large, plump and beautiful grain, which sits in six rows on the stalk, forming a large and beautiful head, developed well to the top and exceeding heavy. While Mr. G. did not plant a large quantity, he grew enough to fully demonstrate that it is a de-cided success in this part. The grain is being introduced by Northrup, King & Co., of Minneapolis, Minn.
Thomas Krewson having drawn the fires from his brick kiln several days ago, and it having cooled sufficiently to admit of taking brick out he finds that he has made com-plete success in the way of man-ufacturing this most useful article here, which many people have con-tended could not be done. The present kiln only contains about 40,000, but Mr. K. having become convinced that they would be all right, began to repair for a second kiln some time since, and now has a large quantity moulded and will begin to place them as soon as they can be gotten out of the way. His next will contain 100,000, and with the experience he has gained thus far, he continues the work with the fullest confidence. There was still too much wind and before the balloon could rise high enough to clear a fence that was near Godfrey was dashed against the fence and quite severely cut and bruised on a barb wire that was on the fence, and to make it still worse he was carried a mile or two below town and dropped with his parachute in Ewanna lake. He suc-ceeded in keeping on top of the water until he was picked up by a couple of boys who were in a boat on the lake. He displayed great courage and nerve during the time he was in the air and water. He is getting along very well but is pret-ty badly cut and bruised.
Curtis W. Sanderlin, who was employed on Anson Rogers farm on South Coos river was found dead in his bed Tuesday morning, having evidently expired in an epileptic fit, to which he had been subject since childhood. He had been working for Mr. Rogers several months. As he did not get up at the usual time Tuesday morning, Mr. Rogers went to the bunkal-tern and found him lying dead in bed, face downward, with face buried in his feather pillow and he probably smothered in that posi-tion while suffering from his af-fliction. Deceased was the son of Rev. and Mrs. F. M. Sanderlin, of Bandon. He was born at Galion, Ohio, Nov. 1, 1873, and came to Oregon with his parents in 1891. He leaves a father, three brothers and three sisters. Burial took place in the south Coos river cem-eterly Wednesday.—Coast Mail.

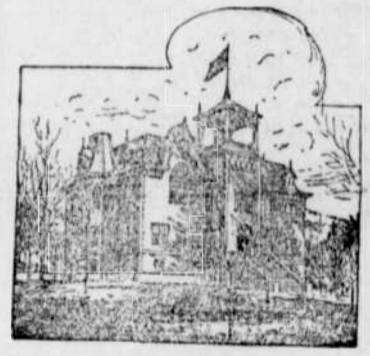
