Hunting Accident.

August Farley met with an accident while hunting in the upper North Coos river country, last Wednesday morning. He was in company with E. G. Winner and Jordan Shaffer, and the party was in the mountains about eight miles from Shaffer's camp. In going down a steep hill, August stepped off a fallen tree on to a rotten snag, which crumbled, allowing his weight to fall on the right foot, causing a dislocation of the ankle and breaking the fibula bone. Jordan Shaffer started immediately for the camp, and returned at 3 a. m. next morning with several men, who improvised a litter and packed the injured man to the camp. In the meantime, Messrs. Winner and Farley set the injured limb, using cedar splints and buckskin thongs, making a first-class job of it. Word was sent to Allegany and from thence to Marshfield, and on Friday Dr. Horsfall left for the scene, returning next day with the patient, who stood the long trip remarkably well. Dr. Horsfall gives Messrs. Winner and Farley great credit for the medical skill displayed, and intimates that results might have been very serious if their knowledge had not been so well applied.—News.
