Three Master Ashore.
Yesterday news was brought to town that there was a vessel ashore at the mouth of Fourmile, a small creek which empties into the ocean, about six miles south of this place, and subsequent information gives out the following facts in the case:
The vessel is a steel bark of 1400 tons owned in Greenock, Scotland, Captain Marr, master, and was on her way from Calao, Peru, to Portland in ballast.
She got out of position in the fog and went ashore yesterday morning about 1:30 o'clock. The place at which she is ashore is free from rocks and is sandy, and at low tide a person can walk around the vessel.
There is a possibility of the bark being floated. The tug Triumph went out last night and is out as we go to press, but there was considerable fog during the night and nothing was accomplished.—Bandon Recorder.

The James Sennet Ashore
A dispatch from Port Townsend, under date of August 22nd, says:
"The steamer Roanoke, which arrived from Nome this afternoon, brings news of another marine disaster in the North. The four-masted schooner James Sennet, Captain J. F. Colstrup, is high and dry on the north end of Unimak Island, having gone ashore August 7, during a dense fog. Captain Colstrup came down on the Roanoke and reports the Sennet as resting easily on the beach, and if no storm comes up she can be floated. The vessel was built this year at Coos Bay and is owned by C. A. Hooper & Co. San Francisco, but was being operated by the North American Trading & Transportation Company, between Puget Sound and St. Michael. She was in ballast on the return trip when she went ashore."
The steamer Brunswick is expected here the last of the week, or the beginning of next, on her way to Alaska. She will take E. Heucken-dorff, and crew, with necessary rigging, gear, etc., to the scene of the wreck of the James Sennet. On their arrival there the fate of the vessel will be determined. It is to be hoped that they will be able to float her, and, we understand, that with favorable weather, there is a good chance of doing so.—Coos Bay News.

Wm. R. Hurst, of Corbin City, spent a couple of days here and on the bay seeking men to work for the mill company at Corbin, where a great deal of work is going on. He succeeded in finding eight here who will go. Mr. Stone is crowding the work as rapidly as circumstances will permit, working about 60 men at present, but will have 75 working in a short time.
