## U. S. MAIL CONTRACTS.

The following, in regards to the lettings of the mail contracts, was furnished us by B. E. Nosler, postmaster of this city, and will be of interest to those intending to bid for contracts for carrying the mails:

MAIL LETTINGS.  
Post Office Department,  
Washington, D. C., Sept. 16.

Proposals will be received at the Office of the Second Assistant Postmaster General, Post Office Department, until 4 p. m., of December 3, 1901, for carrying the mails of the United States from July 1, 1902, to June 30, 1906, upon the star, steamboat, and covered wagon routes of the State of Oregon, as specified in pamphlet advertisements of this date.

Lists of routes, forms of proposals and bonds, and all necessary information will be furnished upon application to the Second Assistant Postmaster General, Washington, D. C.

## INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

1. No bid submitted under this advertisement will be considered unless the bidder shall agree in his bid that in the event of the service being awarded to him he will give his personal supervision to the performance of the same, and will reside on or contiguous to the route.

2. Bidders should state in their proposals the service bid for strictly according to the advertisement, regardless of any changes made in the present service, and the accepted bidder will be required to perform the service within the limit of running time prescribed in this advertisement, without regard to any schedule by which service may have been performed under a previous contract.

10. Every proposal must be accompanied by a bond, with two or more sureties approved by a postmaster, and in cases where the amount of the bond exceeds five thousand dollars, by a postmaster of the first, second, or third class.

11. The approval of the sureties must be by a postmaster.

12. A married woman will not be accepted as a bidder or as a surety, either on the bond of a bidder or upon a contract.

15. Individual sureties on the bond of a bidder must take an oath before an officer qualified to administer oaths that they are the owners of real estate worth, in the aggregate, a sum double the amount of said bond, over and above all debts due and owing by them, and all judgments, mortgages, and executions against them, after allowing all exemptions of every character whatever.

16. Accompanying the bond of a bidder, and as a part thereof, shall be a statement of the sureties, under oath, showing the amount of real estate owned by them, a brief description thereof and its probable value, where it is situated, and in what county and State the record evidence of their title exists. Any surety who swears falsely to this required statement is deemed by the law guilty of perjury, and is punishable as is prescribed by law for that crime.

63. In addition to carrying the mails to the various postoffices on the star routes covered by this advertisement, the carrier on each route will be also required to deliver mail into all boxes and hang small bags or satchels containing mail on cranes or posts that may be erected along the route, under the following conditions:

54. Any person living on or near any star route, and not within the corporate limits of any town or within 80 rods of any postoffice, who desires his mail deposited at a given point on the line of the route by the carrier on said route may provide and erect a suitable box or crane on the roadside, located in such manner as to be reached as conveniently as practicable by the carrier without dismounting from the vehicle or horse, and such person shall file with the postmaster at the postoffice to which his mail is addressed (which shall be one of

the two postoffices on the route on either side of and next to the box or crane) a request in writing for the delivery of his mail to the carrier on the route for deposit at the designated point, at the risk of the addressee. The small bag or satchel above described, as well as the box or crane, must be provided by the person for whose use it is intended without expense to the Department.

55. It shall be the duty of the postmaster at every such postoffice, upon a written order from any person living on or near the star route, to deliver to the proper mail carrier for that route any mail matter—placing in the respective satchels, where such are used, the mail for the persons to whom such satchels belong—with instructions as to the proper mail box or crane at which said mail matter shall be deposited; but registered mail shall not be so delivered unless expressly requested by the addressee in his written order. No mail matter so delivered to a carrier shall be carried past another postoffice on the route before being deposited into a mail box or hung on a crane or post.

56. The carrier on the star route will be required to receive from any postmaster on the route any mail matter or private mail satchel that may be entrusted to him, outside of the usual mail bag, and shall carry such mail matter or private mail satchel to and deposit it into the proper mail box or hang it on the proper mail crane placed on the line of the route for this purpose; such service by the carrier to be without charge to the addressee.

57. The mail carriers must be of good character and of sufficient intelligence to properly handle and deposit the mail along the routes.

58. The Department does not prescribe any particular design of box or satchel to be used for this service, but the person providing either should see that it is of such character as to afford ample protection to his mail. If there is a lock attached to the box, a key is not to be held by the carrier, as he is expected to deposit the mail without the necessity of unlocking the box. The box or crane should be so located on the roadside that the carrier can deposit the mail without leaving his vehicle or horse, and yet not where it will obstruct public travel.

59. The carrier is not required to collect mail from the boxes, but there is no objection to his doing so if it does not interfere with his making the schedule time. The law provides that every carrier of the mail shall receive any mail matter presented to him if properly prepaid by stamps, and deliver the same for mailing at the next postoffice at which he arrives, but that no fees shall be allowed him therefor.

60. Delivery of mail by star-route carriers will not be permitted over such portions of star routes as may have in operation the rural free-delivery service, except as an additional or supplemental service when shown to be necessary and practicable.

61. The depositing of mail along the line of the route will not be required of carriers on steamboat routes.
