The Ice Man, Or Coquille's Future.

In company with Dr. Boyle of Oakland, California, we spent a few very pleasant hours in the beautiful city of Coquille. It had been some years since the Dr. had visited the city and he was much surprised to note the improvement, and was willing to buy a home at once, and we started out to get some information about real estate values. We found an old timer who was well posted on everything. The Dr. was ready, and wanted information, and when the old man said "well, I am willing, come in and squat. Say, young man, ever had a hired girl? I have come to the conclusion that Mrs. H. and I don't suit the average hired girl. No use talking, we've tried 'em all and it don't go; we only ask Thursday afternoon out, but they won't stand for it at all—Oh, yes; real estate—I got off the track—well, you may say that at no time since the fire have real estate values in Coquille City been so high as they are now. By that I do not mean that values are at all fictitious. On the other hand our population has increased so rapidly and city improvements have so advanced, that both business and residence property have advanced in keeping with them, and the growth in value has been a sound, healthy one. I came over from Marshfield in a cattle car the other day with a lady who lives at North Bend—owns a fine property—and she told me she had just hired a girl who came out to San Francisco with the leaguers. Since girl, didn't want to run around all the time, because she didn't know anybody, I guess, and that made me mad, you see, I had gone to an intelligence office—what a misnomer that name is—and hired the girl myself. Told 'em I wanted a fifteen-dollar girl. This girl came out and they told her to strike for twenty-five and she'd get it as easy as rolling off a log. She made a mistake in the number, got into the lady's house, struck her for twenty-five and got it dead easy. Only wanted fifteen, but the agent put her up to it, so as to get more commission. When I heard of it—but I got off the track again, didn't I. The advance in value of business property here has been phenomenal. There has been no great boom here as yet, but it's coming, as sure as the coal will be dug from the Eckley hills, Myrtle Point and Coquille are the coming places, Marshfield will never go behind, for its future is a bright one, and the Eckley coal is going to be the making of Coos county. Port Orford is bound to be the shipping point, and many tons of coal will be placed in bunkers on the heads, and the largest ships will lie softly under the chutes. About twenty years ago a friend of mine bought a block here in Coquille City, had been out here from the east but a short time and didn't know any more about help than most tenderfoot do. Tried Swedes, Norwegians, Germans, Irish and mongrels and finally lit on a Chinaman. Thought he'd struck it rich when he got One Up, but One Up wouldn't do. Got another Chinaman and was worse off than at first, and by that time he'd begun to realize that if he wanted peace in Coquille he'd have to cook his own meals and do—Oh, yes; I was telling about my friend who had bought a block about twenty years ago in Coquille City for \$500 and a few weeks ago he sold the same for \$5000, and it was a bargain at \$5000 and the property will never be any cheaper. If my friend had held on to the block a few more months he would have sold it for a much better price. But he couldn't keep a girl, nor a Chinaman, nor a "Residence" property, particularly in the northeastern part of the city has enhanced in value very rapidly during the last five or six years, and I believe we are building more rapidly than any other city in the county. Conditions here appeal to investors; our tax rate is not high, and our assessed valuations very reasonable. I predict a steady upward tendency in general real estate values, particularly in favored localities, for twenty years to come. Yes and I want to mention that we want a hired girl—age, color or previous condition cut no ice. I furnish all the references required—no others necessary. Seven day's and nights a week out, and the front room for the jewel who takes the place, wages anything within the limit of my salary. Say, Doctor, if you are going down to Fahy's you had better get a move on as you only have five minutes to get to the boat. Yes, call again. Good bye.
