Railway Project for Bohemia Mining District.

The following is an excerpt from an article in the Oregonian of the 15th inst.:

President P. J. Jennings, of Helena and the Musick & Milling Companies of the Bohemia district, announces that arrangements have been completed for building a railroad from Cottage Grove, south-westerly, a distance of 35 miles through a region of heavy timber to the Bohemia mines. It is expected that construction work will be commenced this fall and that about half the track will be laid before spring.

"We have gone so far," said Mr. Jennings yesterday, "that the rest of the work is easy. We have \$500,000 assured for the railroad, largely on the basis of the mineral richness of the district as shown by developments already made. Capital is eager to build an adequate smelter, but there would be no use for the smelter without the railroad, so the road is to go first. This is the natural order. I have not a doubt that the smelter will be provided when we are ready for it. The field is too important to be neglected and the problem of ore, fuel and fluxes practically solves itself here."

Gigantic Combine of Shipbuilders.

New York, Oct. 16.—The Journal and Advertiser says: A new gigantic industrial combination, which is to consolidate the armor-plate manufacturers of this country, enter into the building of war-ships and merchant vessels for the world's trade and take over the large and growing export trade of the United States Steel Corporation, is about to be organized by J. P. Morgan and his allies.

While no official details are obtainable, the project will not only consolidate many details of the steel and fuel business of the country now separated, but also serve to bring into closer relationship these interests and the great railroad interests controlled by the Vanderbilts and the Pennsylvania railroad. These interests are also to be closely allied, if not made a unit, with large interests of like character abroad, and the new company is to be called the Anglo-American Steel Company. E. H. Gary, of the United States Steel Corporation, will, it is said, be president of the new concern.
