Battle in Samar—Ten Killed.

Manila, Oct. 18.—Five hundred bolomen attacked a detachment of 46 men of the Ninth Infantry at Bagajon, on the Gandara river, island of Samar, Wednesday, killing 10 and wounding six. The remainder of the company arrived on the scene in time to prevent further slaughter, and routed the enemy, killing over 100 of them. It is believed that the enemy only retired for reinforcements. As soon as the news was received at Catbalogan two gunboats were dispatched, General Smith going in person to the scene.
